Girl Scout Cookie Sale Gets Underway

in brown uniforms and their older sisters in green uniforms will approach Torrance shoppers and ring rance shoppers and ring doorbells Friday with the question, "Would you like to buy some cookies?" to herald the beginning of the Cookie Sale of Girl Scouts, Los Angeles Council.

Proceeds from the sale, which lasts through Feb. 22, will provide funds for over half of the expenses of administrating Girl Scouts, Los Angeles Council, General operating expenses, including an extensive training program for the 10.000 adult volunteers, registration expenses. program aides, audio-visual material, camp upkeep, office supplies, staff salaries, and all other costs necessary for bringing Scouting to 31,000 girls, are partially defrayed by profits from the sale.

Thousands of little girls Scouting: brownies, intermediates, junior high and sen-ior. Result of an extensive survey by a leading research institution, the change is the first since 1935. Adult Scouts and leaders are currently undergoing intensive training for the transition.

> Under the new program, the Brownie level will be designed for girls aged seven and eight with no set requirements to fulfill. Junior Girl Scouts, ages 9, 10 and 11, will develope skills and work to wards proficiency badges aimed at exploration.

Girls entering their teens will be Cadettes, with intensive work in distinct area of specialization. Achievement inf our areas-social dependability, emergency preparedness, active citizenship and application of the Girl Scout promise-will be measured. girls a means of acquiring and testing the social, recreational and vocation skills they will need as adults.

"Fashion in Fellowships," a slide-discussion, will be delivered by Mrs. Winston Maltby, fellowship chairman of the Long Beach Branch. The film presents facts about the fellowships program together with an overview of women's fashions in the United States from the 1880's to the present, with a projection into the future. Mrs. Baltby developed the

Sorority Offers Fellowship

Mrs. Thomas Black, presi-dent of Palos Verdes-South Bay Alumnae of Alpha Xi Delta, announced today that as part of its national philanthropic program Alpha Xi Delta Fraternity will award a graduate fellowship in the amount of \$1,500 for advanced study in the field of Social Service,

Alpha Xi Delta, national social sorority for college women founded at Lombard College seventy years ago, numbers more than 40,000 college and alumnae mem-

torate in Canon Law from the Vatican University of Rome. They have a daughter.

The AAUW fellowships program annually presents individual stipends of 2,000 to 5,000 dollars each to gifted graduate women scholars for advanced study and research, Fellows use their stipends in study of national and international scope.

Outstanding projects have included the study of Icelandic manuscripts, leading to the creation of a guidebook used by United States servicemen; the development of scientific instruments for testing eyesight; and the analysis of Japanese culture and behavior, with resultent assistance to the United States in World War II.

Since the inception of the program in 1888, three million' dollars have been awarded to 1500 scholars. Last year 52 national and 57 international awards were granted for study in a wide diversity of subject fields.

A 1962-1965 development in the program was the in-auguration of awards for outstanding women teachers of Africa.

Annually the Manhattan Beach Branch contributes funds to the fellowships program. Last year the group gave over 500 dollars, most of it in memoriam of Mrs. Thron Riggs.

The contribution for 1963 will be over 600 dollars, according to Mrs. Lowell Dun-ham, branch fellowships chairman. Monies are raised by the assessment of individual members and by fundraising projects.
