Copter Visits Hospital in **Mercy Plan**

A heliport has been completed at Little Company of Mary Hospital and Friday the first visit to the hospital was made by one of the helicopters of the Sheriff's Department.

The hospital's emergency facilities are being incorporated into a master plan developed by the Sheriff's Department and the Coast Guard to be put into effect when it is necessary to evacuate accident victims by

The helicopters will be used to bring injured from areas which are inaccessible by ambulance.

Such areas could include Catalina Island, autos which fall from coastal cliffs, and ships at sea.


The success of the helicopter as a carrier of mercy, is shown by the rescue of more than 300 persons from the mountain regions by the Sheriff's Department.

Sgt. Everly, of the depart-Ir ment, who landed the first helicopter on the Little Company of Mary Heliport Friday, said that doctors estimated that at least 25 of those 300 would have died had not helicopters been

"Sometimes it would take eight to ten hours to bring injured persons out of the mountains over undeveloped trails," said Sgt. Everly, "while a helicopter can bring them out in eight to ten minutes."

The heliport was built as part of a program to expand the total area of all parking facilities at the hospital. (See story, Page A2)
