

Spiritual Alertness Need Told by Miss Harrison

Spiritual alertness is needed to meet the perplexing problems of mankind, Hazel R. Harrison, of Santa Monica, said in a public lecture in Torrance.

"In the face of national and international turmoil," Miss Harrison declared, "we cannot afford to fold hands and let greed, atheism, and tyrannical ambition run rampant. It is our responsibility, our Christian duty, to alert ourselves to the crying needs of today's world situation."

Public-spirited citizens can help a great deal, she said, by keeping informed of current news, by voting at election time, and by demonstrating that divine wisdom gained through righteous prayer.

Miss Harrison, a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, spoke at the invitation of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Torrance in the church auditorium at 1750 Manuel Ave. on the subject "Christian Science How It Satisfies Human Longings." She was introduced by Scott Albright, First Reader.

Christ Jesus in his Sermon on the Mount promised "that if we seek first the kingdom of God and strive to follow the Christ example in expressing good, all legitimate human desires would be fulfilled," the lecturer declared.

Lasting peace, happiness, security, or satisfaction is not to be found in materialism, Miss Harrison maintained.

"When we seek first, not the material and temporal things that give no lasting satisfaction, but the gloriously rewarding things of Spirit, we find and experience that which truly satisfies," she declared.

Basic to healing through prayer is spiritual understanding of the perfect relationship of God and man, she stated.

"Perfect God, Mind, is the original, the One Cause and Creator; the real man, His image or reflection, is God-like," she said. "A perfect original cannot have an im-

perfect likeness, therefore a satisfied God cannot have a discontented or unsatisfied likeness."

The man of God's creating can never be separated from God's love and protection, she stated. "The healing presence of the Christ," she said, "is available today to all who are receptive to its power. It awakens in us, in you and me, the ability to behold man's true spiritual identity as fearless and free, and enables us to heal ourselves and others."

She called upon her audience to "acknowledge one omnipotent Mind as the governor of all; to acknowledge one omnipresent Love as reflected in an enriched understanding between nations and peoples; and to serve God as His minuteman, ever alert to His will, ever on guard to defend our nation with prayer, and to guard our heritage of freedom as science reveals it."
