Traffic Index Clues Judges To Violators

Fifteen of the 23 Municipal Court Districts in Los Angeles County are soon to be joined in a cooperative system of mutually-indexing traffic citations.

"The mutual indexing system makes possible quick notification of prior offenses for use by judges in determining penalties to be set upon traffic violators," said Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, chairman of the Courts Department on the Board of Supervisors.

Municipal Court Judge Joseph A. Sprankle, Jr., of Pasadena, a leader in the mutual indexing system, has informed Hahn that the eight districts which have not joined the program handled approximately 16 percent of the 1,260,000 traffice citations issued last year in the county.

The districts not yet in the system are Alhambra, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Culver City, East Los Angeles, Inglewood, Pomona and South Gate.

Judge Sprankle has, by letter, again asked the presiding judges of those districts to consider joining the County-wide mutual indexing system on a voluntary

"Before this system was established," Hahn said, "a judge had no quick way of knowing how many violations a defendant had on a county-wide basis. He only had on record the past offenses within the jurisdiction involved, and the offender could have a previous record of violations in other sections of the county."
