

A beautiful city has to be a little deeper, a little better than the physical aspects

It's a community filled with happy, friendly people who have accepted disappointment and success in building their city's future.

It's a community filled with people who have made kindness a habit.

The people who have unselfishlessly given their time to the city - - in service, in duty.

They are the wonderful part of a city. They are the creators of beauty. They have developed the things that God has given to us. They have removed the necessity of wealth and replace it with ambition.

The se dedicated people have given so much and yet they've forgotten the excitement of Miami, the mystery of Rome, the glamour of Hollywood, but for Torrance they've left something special, something unique ... beauty.
