The fee, which includes pageant ticket, bus fare, and trip insurance, is \$6 (center section) or \$5 (side section). "Ramona" is a romantic drama of Old California played in a natural amphitheater with an entire mountainside as a backdrop and stage. 3 Torrance Students Earn Honors at UC

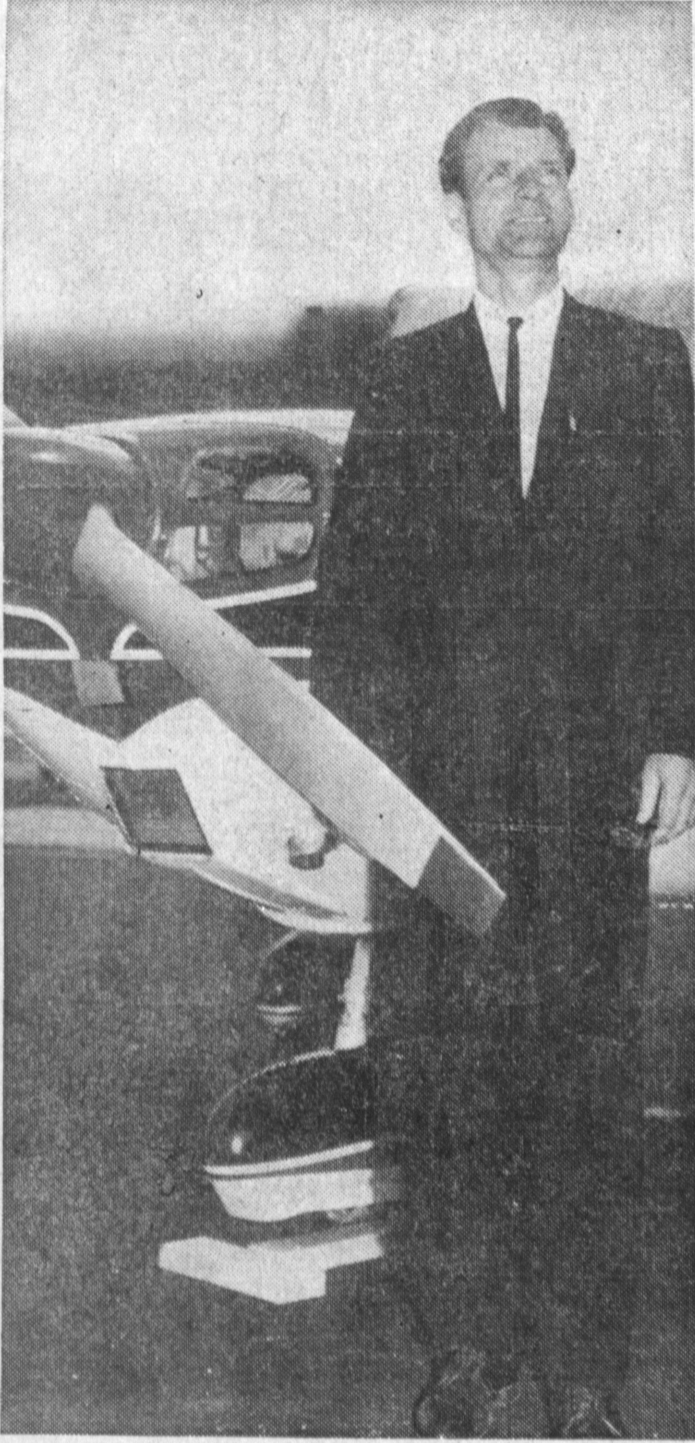
Three students from Torrance earned academic distinction at the University of California, Santa Barbara, according to Lyle G. Reynolds, dean of students.
