Remelmeyer Says 'Biggest' Armed Forces Parade in '63

"Because we expect this year's Torrance Armed Forces Day Parade on May 18 to be the biggest yet, we plan to expand the official reviewing stand double over what it was last year."

These were the words of a report made this week by Stanley E. Remelmeyer, named by General Celebration Chairman Fred Rathert as reviewing stand committee chairman.

Remelmeyer said that in previous years, the VIP

stand accommodated some 50 honored visitors and guests at the parade. This year he expects at least 100 official visitors to witness what has been officially forecast as the largest Armed Forces parade "west of the Rockies."

This year will mark the fourth straight year for the Torrance parade. Parade Grand Marshal will be Norman S. Paul, Assistant Secretary of Defense. Many dignitaries have accepted invi-

tations to share the reviewing stand with him at the parade.

The reviewing stand will be located in front of the Torrance City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd.

Mayor Albert Isen will serve as official host as chief administrator of the City of

Torrance.

This year is Remelmeyer's third as parade reviewing stand committee Chairman, his fourth year on the parade committee. Now City Attorney, he has lived eight years in Torrance and makes his home at 1225 Greenwood Ave.
