Supplementing his talk will be a panel of four speakers, with Dr. Wendell Black, president of Harbor College, as moderator. Questions from the floor will be answered.

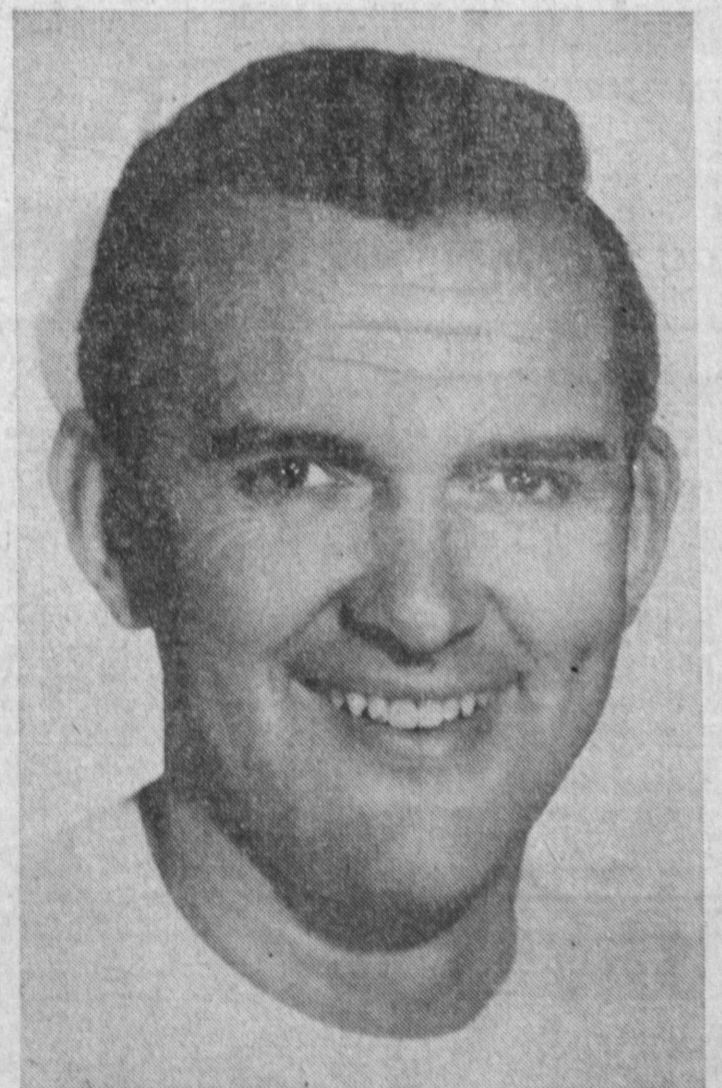
