

K.C.'s Plan Benefit Feed This Sunday

The 14th Annual Barbecue and fiesta for Rancho San Antonio, California's "Boys' Town of the West," will be held Sunday, April 28.

The event is sponsored by the Southern California Knights of Columbus each year.

The general public is invited to visit the Rancho on this day to get acquainted with its rehabilitation program which has restored approximately 2500 misdirected boys of all races, creeds, and national origins, to good citizenship.

According to Dick Jooster, drive chairman for St. Gerard Council 4919, the gala event will bring to a close a two-month fund campaign seeking further development of the Rancho. This local unit of the order, together with more than 90 other councils, has been engaged in this drive, which is the Knight's principal charity project.

Pit barbecue, expected to serve more than 15,000 barbecue dinners between 11:30 a.m. and 8 p.m., will be reminiscent of romantic California days. There will be no admission charge or parking fee. Boys residing at the Rancho will conduct free guided tours through the modern buildings during the event. A fun zone for children will be highlighted by a giant spaceship which takes off on an imaginary flight to the moon.

The Rancho, located on a 40-acre site at 2100 Plummer St., Chatsworth, is reached by taking the Ventura freeway to the Winnetka Ave. turn-off. Specially posted signs will provide further directions.

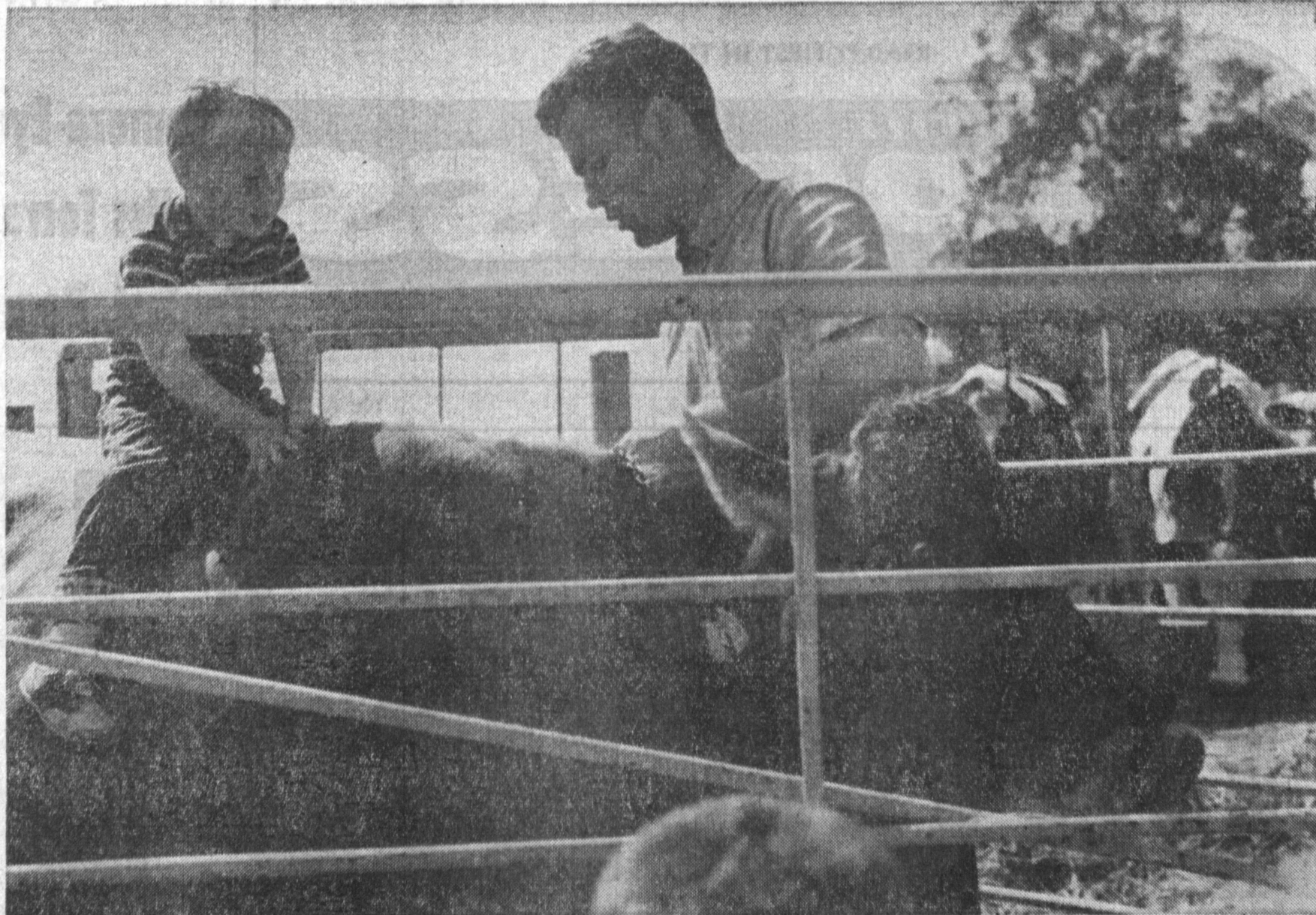
Aquarium Society Meets Tomorrow

Big League Rodeo Debuts at New Long Beach Arena

Long Beach's new multi-million dollar Arena will make its debut on the big league rodeo trail next month, as top-flight cowboys meet the west's best livestock in the Harbor area's first indoor presentation of the action-packed sport.

Last year's National Finals Rodeo, at the L. A. Sports Arena, was a spectacular success. Its producer, Lex Connelly, is general manager of the up-coming Long Beach event.

Among the contestants planning to appear are men like Dean Oliver, of Idaho, five time World Champion Calf Roper and rodeo's currently leading money winner; Bill Martinelli, of Playa del Rey, now number two man in saddle bronc riding; Harry Charters, World Champ in 1959 and now fourth in money won; Pete Crump, Bob Robinson, and Jim Charles, all among the top ten bull riders in the nation last year; and Sherman Sullins, Oklahoma cowboy ranking third in steer wrestling.

According to Connelly, these nationally ranked pros will compete for a guaranteed purse of \$12,000. One of the richest of the spring season. The best bucking broncs and bulls from three large West Coast livestock strings will be featured in five performances: 8 p.m. Friday, May 3; 2 and 8 p.m. Saturday, May 4; 1:30 and 5:30 p.m., Sunday, May 5.

The Arena has a capacity of 10,500 plush seats all with a clear view of such traditional rodeo contests as saddle bronc riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, bareback riding and calf roping, plus clowns and a girls barrel race.
