Col. Charles Noble Named

Colonel Charles C. Noble, a resident of Torrance, has been named the winner of the Wheeler Medal, the highest military engineering award made annually by The Society of American Military Engineers to a member of the Corps of Engineers of the Army. Colonel Noble is cited for his outstanding performance as Director of the Atlas D & E and Minuteman ICBM construction programs.

The medal will be presented to Colonel Noble at the Annual Military Engineer Dinner on May 20 at the Mayflower Hotel, Washington, D.C.

During the work on the Atlas D & E series, Col. Noble supervised construction of some 54 launchers with a total cost of \$251,000,000. The Minuteman system, involving some 800 launchers, was initiated in March 1961, and since then, contracts amounting to over \$337,000,000 have been awarded for this program.

York, Col. Noble is a 1940 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy. In 1948 he received an M.S. degree in civil engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. His duty assignments have included the 151st Engineer Group, Fort Benning, Georgia, and the Louisville Engineer District where he served just prior to his present assignment as Deputy Commander of the Corps of Engineers Ballistic Missile Construction Office in Los Angeles.

The Wheeler Medal, named for Lt. Gen. Raymond A. Wheeler, former Chief of Engineers, U. S. Army, and a past president of The Society, is offered as an annual award to a member of the Corps of Engineers of the Army, regular, reserve, National Guard, or civilian, on active or inactive duty or retired, whose outstanding contribution to military engineering reflects the highest achievement in design, construction, administration, research, or development.

County Library Sets a Record

Highest monthly circulation figure in the 50 year history of the Los Angeles County Public Library was achieved during March despite a decline in reading of fiction works by adults and children alike.

Total circulation for March was 919,949. In addition to being the highest monthly circulation figure it was the first time borrowers checked out over 900,000 books and magazines in any one month, Geller said.

Highest previous circulation was March, 1962, when the figure reached 899,195. Total circulation through the County Library's 110 community and institutional branches for the nine months of the fiscal year now stands at 6,807,315, which represents a gain of 221,421 over the same period of last year.
