Torrance Gala Fete

Regular Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine and Coast Guard units from throughout the Southland will be leading off the fourth annual Torrance Armed Forces Day Parade, Saturday, May 18, General Chairman Fred Rathert announced today.

They will be followed by National Guard and Reserve elements, Naval and Air Force ROTC units, and a host of non-military marching units, he said.

Heading the parade column will be the parade grand marshal, Norman S. Paul, assistant secretary of defense, from Washington, D.C. In the front of the procession, along with Secretary Paul, will be Mayor Albert Isen, Miss Torrance of 1963, Marlene Norsoph, and other dignitaries and outstanding personalities.
