**Area Factory Workers Weekly Wage Hits \$113.40**

Production workers in manufacturing industries in the Los Angeles-Long Beach metropolitan area earned an average of \$113.40 per week in March, an increase from a year ago of \$2.97, or 2.7 percent, Ernest B. Webb, California director of industrial relations, announced. After allowing for federal and state taxes and the rise in consumer prices over the year, the "real" spendable earnings for a worker with three dependents averaged \$90.79, an over-the-year gain of 0.4 percent. Hourly earnings averaged \$2.80 in March, the same amount as in January and February, and eight cents more than in March, 1962. Working time averaged 40.5 hours in March, a rise of 0.2 hour from February and almost the same as a year ago. Overtime averaged 2.7 hours per week per production worker, the same high level as in March 1962.

States to provide haven in the event of war for combat aircraft returning from missions when their home bases are inoperable. Communications, crash and rescue, refueling, medical, transportation and other services are provided by the Reserve Recovery units.
