BAR GAME SPAT ENDS IN DEATH What started out as a

friendly game of shuffleboard in a downtown Torrance bar ended in death yesterday for a 52-year-old Torrance man.

And Warren Robert Heaton, 22, son of the manager of the Rome Cable division Torrance plant of Alcoa, is held without bail in county jail on a charge of murdering Cruz Garcia Guerra o 3211/2 Carson St. Heaton, who lives at 814 Sartori St., was playing shuffleboard early Monday morning in Rick's Bar with Guerra for a reported bet of \$5, according to witnesses. After Heaton won the game, witnesses told police, Guerra didn't pay him, and Heaton, apparently enraged, pulled out a .22 caliber pistol from his pocket and shot Guerra between the eye and the bridge of the nose, according to what those in the bar told police. Guerra was rushed to Harbor General Hospital, where four doctors worked in a vain effort to save his life. He died a little more than 24 hours after the shooting. Heaton left the bar on foot after the shooting, then called his father. The Torrance preliminary budget amounts to \$9,123,-969, which is \$702,879 higher than last year's final budget.
