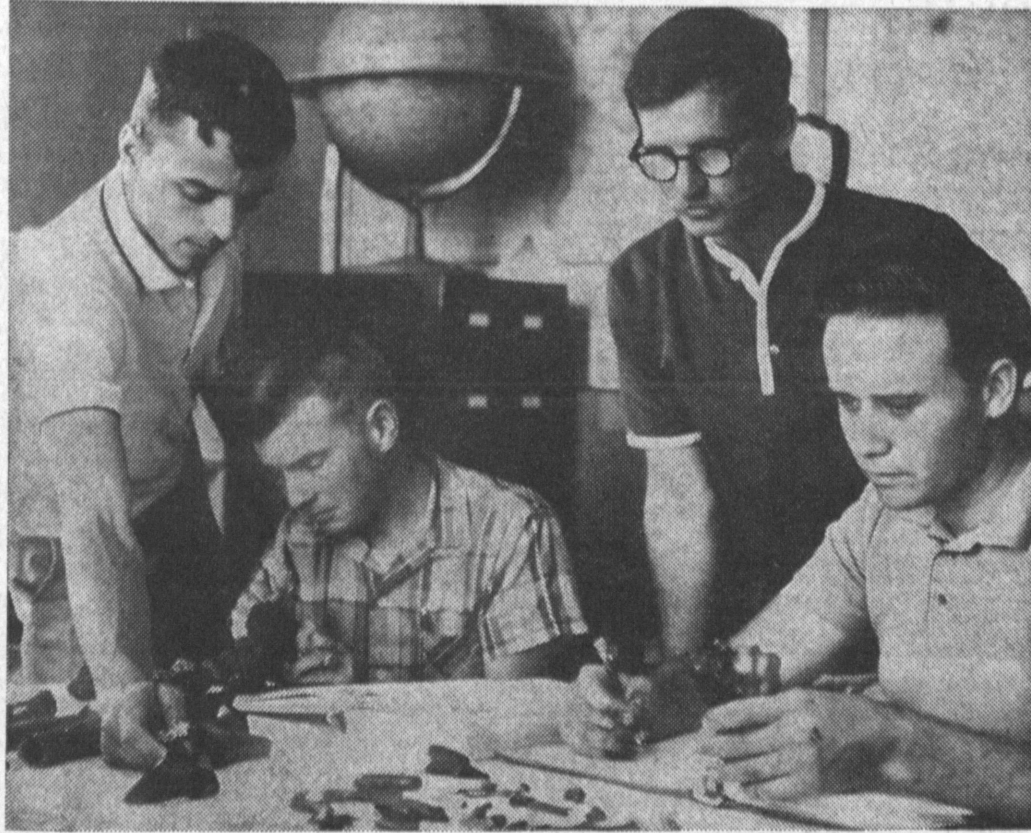

UNDER EARTH'S SURFACE

El Camino Geologists Dig Up 'Bonanza' of Bones

Excavations at Sycamore and La Brea Avenues in Los Angeles that uncovered material containing the bones of prehistoric animals are becoming a collector's bonanza for El Camino earth science students.

Assisted by Al Fanti, former El Camino student and owner of the Fanti Trucking Co., three boys, Mike Porter, Mike McGee and Larie Richardson, began an examination of tar-rock materials supplied by Fanti and uncovered bones of animals that had lived over 20,000 years ago.

So far the students have cleaned what appears to be the lower jaw of a bison, a saber-tooth cat tusk and bones of a dire wolf and other smaller rodents.

Cleaning processes for the materials require careful dripping and scrubbing of the tar in kerosene solvent to separate the material from the bone specimens.

Once cleaned, the specimens are identified through research and then classified for exhibit.

"It's hard and often dirty work the students are doing, but the excitement of discovery and the educational experience can't be duplicated," Barney Pipkin, earth science instructor, said.

TORRANCE STARS SCORE IN TRACK

Three Torrance track stars acquitted themselves well over the weekend.

Kurt Klein, former North High runner, now competing for El Camino College, added the state junior college 880 crown to his Southern California title, winning in 1:52.5 at Modesto, again beating Davis of Long Beach, as well as the north's best half-milers.

Two South High performers scored in the Southland CIF track finals at Cerritos College. Harry Ruitermann was third in the Class B shot put at 54-6 1/2, two feet better than his previous peak.

Wes, Fox, Class C 660 runner, finished fourth in the finals, clocking 1:24.8 for his best career mark. The two South High thinclads both won Bay League championships.

RED CROSS SETS BABY CARE CLASSES
