

Packing Tips Given For June Brides

June brides lacking experience at packing suitcases may be unfamiliar with such terms as "layer packing" and heavy things toward the hinge," but now's the time to learn, says a travel expert.

These are among the hints on packing a suitcase developed by Miss Carol Lane, women's travel director for Shell Oil Company.

"They are especially timely now with the month of June just peeking around the corner," Carol says. "And they apply to both bride and groom, and anyone else who is planning a trip."

She shows how to pack a two-week wardrobe with ease into a single 28-inch suitcase. Here are some of the things that make it possible:

ONE: Layer packing — Clothing should be packed in layers divided by luggage leaves made of peltin, with one complete outfit or type of clothing to each layer.

Layers keep clothes wrinkle-free and permit easy locating of any item needed by lifting out the layers down to the one needed.

TWO: Heavy items, such as shoes, cosmetics, shaving gear, should be packed towards the hinge so they won't slide and wrinkle clothing when suitcase is carried.

THREE: Pack cosmetics and sundries in small plastic bags in small amounts to avoid the weight and clutter of large containers. Tuck other items in the toes of shoes.

FOUR: Pack shoulders of suits, dresses and blouses towards the hinge of the suitcase. Fold the balance of the jacket up at the waist, fold in the sleeves from the sides, crossing them.

FIVE: Pack trousers and skirts the width of the suitcase, trousers folded about at the knees and skirts folded first with a bite from each side to the back of the skirt, then laid the width of the suitcase.

SIX: Miscellaneous hints include: scarves and veils

allow dress and hat changes without taking up space... clutch bags and tote-bags pack flat and add no weight... a beach towel can serve as a layer on which play clothes are packed.

There are other hints in Miss Lane's booklet "Touring Can Be Child's Play," available on request to Miss Carol Lane, Shell Oil Company, 1008 West 6th Street, Los Angeles 54, California.

With these hints, Miss Lane says, it is easy to pack each of the following wardrobes into a 28-inch suitcase:

For the bride: two dresses or ensembles, two casual dresses in drip-dry, one sweater, six hose, three gloves, two bathing suits, two bermuda shorts, one cap set, one clutch bag, three sets lingerie, two nighties, two robes, two scarves, three pair shoes, one soft packable hat or veil, personal items including jewelry.

For the groom: one lightweight suit (one suit worn), one sports coat, four shirts, two T-shirts, two swim suits, two bermuda shorts, one sweater, or jacket, three sets underclothing, five pair socks, four ties, one robe, two pair shoes (one pair worn), eight handkerchiefs, one cap, personal items, one sweat shirt.
