I had to pick up my credentials Friday night at the Beverly Hilton. As we arrived, the high school crowd in their prom clothes were driving up. When we entered the Pavilion Room to pick up the tickets, I had my first taste of the enormous undertaking public-relationswise that a presidential tour encompasses.

The Pavilion Room was lined with tables of typewriters, a wall of telephone booths, teletype machines, and facilities for telegrams and cablegrams for on-thespot coverage by wire services and metropolitan dailies. My credentials consisted of a special parking sticker and a ribbon which said "Press-Kennedy."

The parking sticker proved its worth Saturday morning. With 3,000 women attending the breakfast, parking could have posed a problem without it. The first thing that caught my attention in our assigned parking lot directly behind the Palladium were the number of uniformed police and police cars.

A red carpet had been rolled out leading from the lot to the back entrance of the Palladium for the president. Along the streets throngs of citizens with still cameras and motion picture cameras were waiting to take a picture of Kennedy as he drove up. Newspaper photographers were in the parking lot and inside the building.

Inside, our press ribbons got us into the special press section. We were seated at individual tables in the balcony which commanded a good view of the stage above the heads of the crowd seated below. We started to eat at 9 a.m. Our advance press releases of the president's itinerary had informed us that he would be leaving the Beverly Hilton at 9:10 and would arrive at 9:35.

Preliminaries got under way while we were eating. Shortly before Kennedy's arrival the band began' to play. Photographers went downstairs to a roped-off section in front of the stage, and as the band began to play "Hail the Chief," Kennedy walked on stage.

The crowd gave him a standing ovation. When he was seated, and we were seated, the mistress of ceremonies introduced our senator - Clair Engel - who introduced him.

His speech lasted less than half an hour and the breakfast ended at 10:15 on schedule. The president left as quickly as he had arrived. When we got out he was already gone.

Seeing him was a thrill - and I will remember the experience with pride.
