Greg is a baseball pitcher on the Dodgers in the North Torrance Little League East.

On this day Greg pitched a "perfect game." He struck out 16 batters. Only two batters hit to the infield and both were thrown out at first base. The first ball hit to the infield was a tip back to Greg. The other ball was a hard hit ball hit deep in the hole. The shortstop made a brilliant play on it throwing the boy out.

At no time did Greg have a 3 and 2 count on any batter. In the full six innings he threw only 12 balls. The rest were strikes.

In the nine years of organized Little League baseball in North Torrance, this is the first perfect game ever pitched. In the major leagues there have been only six. The last one was pitched by Don Larson of the New York Yankees in the World Series
