

Young Torrance Musicians Shine in Sparkling Review

A fast-rising Torrance band and several Torrance vocal artists and groups appeared in "Angel on His Shoulder" a sparkling review featuring promising young area talent recently in the Embassy Theater, Ninth and Grand, Los Angeles.

The show was built around Wally the Clown, known on the national entertainment circuit as "the Most Beautiful Clown in the World," a claim made on the basis of a \$20,000 wardrobe.

"The Baymen" comprising Palos Verdes Estates, Manhattan Beach, and Torrance instrumentalists, was the featured band. Jim Wellman, 20009 Wayne Ave., Torrance, a 1963 graduate of Bishop Montgomery High School, is leader.

Among Baymen credits are recent appearances at Cinnamon Cider, Holly-

wood's premiere teen club, Pacific Ocean Park, South High School (Cotton Ball), Loyola University, Palm Springs Youth Center, UCLA, and Temple City, Bishop Montgomery, Jordan (Long Beach), Polytechnic, Downey, and Hajove High Schools.

The Baymen were reportedly a hit last fall at the annual Fallon, Nevada, Stampede, appearing twice at post-rodeo dances. The Fallon Stampede is annually one of the outstanding rodeos in the West. Since their first success, they have returned twice to Fallon to add to their popular acclaim.

Miss Francine Blaise, a talented 8-year-old ballerina from the Torrance area, appeared with Wally the Clown in the opening dance presentation.

Other South Bay area attractions were the Twin-tones, Sherrie Ingram and Judy Ahlman, who established themselves in the South Bay area through frequent appearances. They joined with Debby Jones and Marla King, also of the Manhattan Beach - Redondo Beach area, in "glamour girl" supporting roles during the review.

Wally's brilliant clown wardrobe included his "Real Royal Rose Robe," which he wore in the grand finale. Trimmed with Mother-of-Pearl, this robe contains remnants of the Royal Ermine which adorned Queen Elizabeth's coronation robe.

Torrance to Pick Up Rubbish on July 4

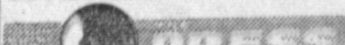
There's no rest for the wicked — nor for Torrance rubbish collectors.
