

## **Rising Sun Of Nippon Flies Here**

The Rising Sun of wartime Japan is making a brief revival here. A Nipponese World War II fighter plane has been painstakingly revived and made its first flight this week after nearly two decades of inactivity. **It** is the only aircraft of its kind in the world in flying trim. Resurgence of the Pacific combat veteran was accomplished by Garrett-Ai-Research aviation service division at its L.A. International Airport facility. AiResearch mechanics and technicians dismantled the plane literally into "bits and deces" before putting it in operational shape.

It was made airworthy for the Torrance Air Museum, which is currently in the planning stage and which acquired the aircraf
