#### Women Voters Urge Funds for Bill 636

A call to action was received this week by the League of Women Voters of Torrance from the state league regarding revenue measures passed on the final day of the legislative session in Sacramento which resulted in deletion of funds budgeted for Short-Doyle services and education.

League members are urging legislators now in special session to give high priority to money to implement Senate Bill 636 which passed both houses of the legislature by overwhelming votes and to increase school aid.

Support to have funds budgeted to carry out education and mental health services is also being sought by league members from other citizens.

The League of Women Voters of California has actively endorsed improved experience and service to mental health services in professional and non-profes- this state for many years. Members worked for passage of the Short-Doyle Act for Community Mental Health services which was passed by the legislature in

Purpose of the Short-Doyle law is to encourage and financially assist local governments in establishing locally administered and locally controlled mental

health programs. Senate bill 636 increases to 75 percent the amount the state government may reimburse local givernment for these serv-


California League members have worked towards securing a high standard of education and towards improving the financial structure of public elementary and secondary education ever since they completed their study of public education in the state.
