
The Mounted Police Saddle Up

policemen will be riding through local fields for the next few weeks looking primarily for illegal marijuana but also keeping an eye open for other items possibly discarded from burglaries.



A PIECE of plant life believed to be marijuana is inspected by two members of the Torrance mounted police, Sgt. Lee Risler and John Burnett. Any found marijuana plants or ones sus-

pected of being marijuana will be reported to Lt. Cook of the Police Dept., who, with members of the vice detail, will verify and confiscate all such plants.

Torrance's mounted police, a crack reserve outfit, is one of the city's bestmounted advertisements.

But these modern-day Bat Masterson types do more than ride in parades. They patrol, and they help round out the city's law enforcement program.

The weekend of the recent racial march in Torrance, the mounties were out in force early on a search for marijuana in nearby fields. They were also on standby duty in case they were needed in the Southwood area to help quell disturbances.

They weren't called on that time, since the situation was kept under control. But — they were ready, and in the meantime they were in the field carrying on a difficult and necessary assignment.

These men, all civilians, who ride and who assist the police department in their own non-working hours, will be performing again in the ninth annual RCA Rodeo Aug.3 and 4 in the windup to the city's big Ranchero Days celebration which starts July 31 and is cosponsored by the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Torrance police assn.

The Torrance mounted police — between 25 and 30

strong — have been riding since 1952 when the unit was formed as part of local reserve forces by Lt. D. C. Cook. The mounties ride in about 12 parades a year, including the Armed Forces Parade here, and events in Palm Springs, Santa Maria, San Diego, Huntington Beach

and Pomona, among others.

They are among the city's best advertisements in their snappy uniforms, with their precision drilling, and this kind of advertisement is one of the crack unit's main functions — sort of riding good will ambassadors for Tor-

In addition, though, the mounties, who will be featured in the RCA Rdeo that winds up Ranchero Days here in Torrance Aug. 3 and 4, are a trained police unit.

They can help search for marijuana as shown in these pictures, or they can aid in flood control work, as during last winter's heavy torrents. They can be and have, been a major factor in searchs for missing persons, and are available for any kind of special police duty.

The mounties meet every month in their own building at 20300 Madrona. They supply all their own equipment including trucks, trailer, saddles, uniform and guns.

The Ranchero Days fete, which begins July 31, will be at the field just east of Del Amo Shopping Center, at Sepulveda and Madrona.
