

Sea Barrier Job Savings Reported

Substantial savings in the contract for construction of 14 observation wells as part of the barrier program to halt sea water infiltration in the Coastal basin were reported today by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The water well contract has been awarded by the board of supervisors to Bowline Drilling, Bakersfield, on a low bid of \$52,172.50.

"This is nearly \$60,000 less than official estimates for important water conservation project," Chace said.

Site of the observation wells will be in Prospect Avenue between Vincent Street and Torrance Boulevard in Redondo Beach.

Chace said two additional units of the barrier program are under construction. One is a 5.9-miles water supply pipeline and the other involves installation of 12 recharge wells.

The entire program is designed to forge an 11-mile fresh water barrier to prevent further ocean brine intrusion from Playa del Rey to Palos Verdes Hills.

Chace said drilling of the new wells will begin in two or three weeks and set for completion in about six months.
