Apartment Building-A Big Boom

Torrance continues to grow.

On the heels of Wednesday's report on the city's climb to the 120,000 population mark, the city building department today issued its July report, showing 289 building permits, totaling \$4,089,365.

The \$4 million-plus figure includes more than \$3 million for multiple dwellings, presaging further population increases. Single dwellings accounted for \$297,000, and commercial and industrial buildings, \$15,-000. Additions, alterations and repairs to existing buildings added nearly \$300,000 to

Among the major items are a 38-unit, \$456,000 apartment building at 3118 Newton, for which Paul Nickel received the permit, and other units in the same block, planned by Nickel, of 11, 6, 6, 31 and 29 units with resptctive valuations of \$80,000, \$76,420, \$76,420, \$291,000 and \$357,000.

Nickel also has a \$255,000, 20-unit project in the 25000 block on Tandem Way.

Three 26-unit, \$266,000 apartment projects were approved in the 20700 block on Anza, planned by Sponseller Bldg. Corp.
