## Women Executives to Convene at USC

Registrations are being accepted now for a week-long executive development conference for women executives to be held Aug. 25-31 at the University of Southern California's Graduate School of Business Administration.

Planned by the Business and Professional Women's Foundation and the USC Office of Executive Programs, the conference will be the first of its type in the West and will be particularly tailored for women executives from middle and near-top management. Attendance will be limited in order to develop a close rapport between participants and lecturers.

"We intend to look at the management problems of the woman executive, rather than the problems of being a woman in management," says Dr. Preston Martin, director of USC's Executive Programs.

"The program will not be designed to identify the differences between men and women in the executive world," adds Dr. Douglas C. Basil, professor of management in USC's Graduate School of Business Administration. "Instead, we will seek to identify the process of management, management problems, and how these problems may be solved." Dr. Basil will coordinate USC's faculty effort for the conference.

Learning by doing will be a conference accent. Faculty lectures will be followed by workshops wherein participants will be presented with problems of decision-making. They will also play an executive simulation game, in which they will have an opportunity to make decisions and see the results of competitive action and economic factors.

Business and Professional Women's Coordinator for the conference is Mrs. Dorothy Ford, national first vice president of B&PW, consultant to the Los Angeles County schools and a member of the faculty of USC's University College.

Mrs. Vinnie A. Hutchison, president of All American Markets, Inc., is chairman of the B&PW Advisory committee, formed especially for the conference.

## Sewing Circles

If you have a portable sewing machine, and now find that you would prefer a console model, or if you have a good machine inside an ugly old cabinet, perhaps you've already given some thought to a new removed at will, retaining their portability while providing convenient sewing conditions at home.

Mrs. J. D. Clune is proud of her lovely table made for her by her husband, whose hobby is cabinet making. Marge's machine is recessed in the center of a large table, with plenty of room to work on both sides and finished to match other bedroom furniture also made by her talented husband.

If I were to design a table which I considered ideal, it would be very much like Marge's. Most portables are built in such a way that they can be set into a surface and

removed at will, retaining their portability while providing convenient sewing conditions at home.

If room permits, a curved sewing table which wraps around on both sides to put everything in easy reach is quite nice. But if room is scarce, lovely arrangements can be built into closet doors or other wall recesses.

A corner is also very good, economical in terms of space and allowing above-surface storage area for tread and pins as well as holding a lamp.

Cabinets, with doors instead of drawers, — easier for the amateur cabinet maker, — allow ample room for extra materials, shears, and a pattern file. A drop leaf, like those on regular sewing cabinets, will give extra room when needed. These are easy to install, using a piano hinge.

For those who are at present struggling with inadequate work space, another idea is a sewing apron. The ideal apron is a wrap around model with large pockets and strong loops. A little pocket on the bib will hold your thimble, a large hook beside it for your little tape case. A loop sewn into the belt just above the pocket will keep your shears available even if you move around and out of the reach of little ones.

Denim is good for such an apron, not too bad about picking up lint, or showing soil. These aprons are fine gifts for friends who sew, and inexpensive to have several for yourself.

### TODAY'S HINT

Save those small pieces of cardboard that come in your hem tape and rick-rack for one-time hem guages or button spacers. Toilet tissue cardboard and shoeboxes also help your storage problem. Zippers can be stored inside towel rolls with a piece of foil or saran film over the end, held by a rubber band.

Senator Thomas M. Rees (Democrat-Los Angeles) has reappointed Mrs. Edmond (Martha) Armstrong of the South Bay area to the Democratic State Central Committee of California.

Mrs. Armstrong is the past president of the Democratic Women's Society of the South Bay and a member of the Women's Democratic Forum. She was director of Senator Rees' 1962 campaign in the South Bay area.

Mrs. Carmen H. Warschaw, Southern California Women's Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee and a member of the state Fair Employment Practices Commission, has been named chairman of the Democratic Party's Civil Rights Division, Democratic State Chairman Eugene L.

Wyman has announced. The Party's Civil Rights Division has been created to set up a grass roots program in California to aid in the implementation of state laws designed to wipe out discrimination.

Mrs. Warschaw recently led a delegation of Southern California women who met with President John F. Kennedy at the White House to discuss what women can do in their own communities to help ease civil rights tension.

Mrs. Warschaw said that the party is now in the process of forming regional committees in both Northern and Southern California which will then be charged with developing enforcement units in local communities to pinpoint areas of discrimination.
