THREE LOMITA ROAD JOBS SET; FUNDS ALLOTTED

The board of supervisors on motion by Supervisor Burton W. Chace has allocated \$3,700 for improvement of three county roads in the Lomita area. Supervisor Chace said the work, to begin this week, includes pouring of 103,000 square feet of pavement on the following sections of county roads: 248th Street from Pennsylvania Avenue to Cypress Street, Moon ave-

nue from Lomita Boulevard to 247th Street, and Pennsylvania Avenue from Lomita Boulevard to 248th Street. Chace urged motorists to drive with caution in construction areas.

6.5 Miles of Street Work Slated in RHE

Nearly six and a half miles of major city streets will be improved in the city of Rolling Hills Estates under terms of a \$3,385 allocation approved today by the board of supervisors. Supervisor Burton W. Chace said the money will be spent for roadway patch-

ing striping, resurfacing and sign installation on the following streets: Palos Verdes Drive North from Dapplegray Lane to the north city boundary, Silver Spur Road from Palos Verdes Drive North to Wilwood Road and from Crenshaw Boulevard to Dry

Young Archers Take Aim at Tourney of Champions

Young archers throughout the county will travel to the Whittier Narrows Regional Archery Range in South El Monte, for the 1963 archery tournament of champions Saturday at 9 a.m. Boys and girls will compete separately in four age classifications including peewees (7-10 years), midgets (11-12 years), juniors (13-15 years) and seniors (16-18 years). Trophies donated by the Archery Council will be

awarded to first and second place winners of instinctive and freestyle events in each age category. Instinctive events are those in which bows are not equipped with sights. Freestyle competition includes the use of sights. Distances range from 30 feet in the peewee instinctive event to 150 feet in the junior and senior freestyle contests. Harold Sanders of the San Gabriel Valley Archery Assn. will be field cap-

tain during the tournament. In addition to trophies, medals will be awarded to third and fourth place winners, and ribbons will go to fifth and sixth places. A team trophy will be awarded to the park or playground team accumulating the greatest number of first, second and third places. The archery tournament of champions is sponsored by the county department of parks and recreation. Only teams entered officially through local parks are eligible to compete. The three top drivers in points for the 1963 Figure 8 Stock Car racing season at Gardena's Ascot Park, 183rd St. at So. Vermont Ave., Ben Steele of Gardena, Bob Hobbs of San Pedro, and Joe Drew of Lawndale, will take on a 50-car field in this Sunday night's nine event racing program, which begins at 8:15 p.m., preceded by time trials at 7:15 p.m.

The trio are in a three-way fight for this year's title with Steele driving a Chevrolet on top with 1260 points; Hobbs, in another Chevie, with 890, and Drew, in a Ford with 780.

Two new threats have come to light in the last four weeks of racing, Jack "Red" Frick of Venice, and Ed Ferro of Torrance. Frick has won two mains and come second in another in four weeks of racing. Ferro won his first feature victory just three weeks ago.

Other former main event winners are Leon Garrett of Lawndale who will drive a Ford; Frank McEwan of Torrance in a Chevie; and Bucky Fallon, of Redondo Beach in a Chevie.

The 20 fastest qualifiers of the night will start the 15-lap main event on the tricky criss-cross circuit. Other racing includes a 10-lap semi-main, four 8-lap heat races, and a 4-lap trophy dash.

Gates will open at 6:30 p.m., when 7,000 general admission seats go on sale at popular prices. Adult admission is \$1.95 with juniors \$1, and children under eight free with an adult.

Hoyle Locking Up Crown IN CRA's Big-Car Derby

Buena Park's smooth-driving Bob Hogle, barring unforeseen misfortunes, appears to be an almost certain 1963 California Racing Assn. big car champion, judging from his recent showing every Wednesday night at Ascot Park, 183rd and Vermont in Gardena.

Hogle, wheeling the sleek Anaheim Morales Bros. "T-male Wagon" Offenhauser in impeccable style, has won five Ascot main events, plus one at Sacramento, and these victories, coupled with a flock of seconds and thirds, has vaulted the handsome Buena Park ace into an almost unchallengeable position.

With approximately two months of solid racing left, plus a 100-lap Labor Day special and the season's finale, the traditional 100-lap Grand Prix left on the CRA

agenda, Hogle is leading his closet competitor, Dee Jones of Phoenix, by more than 200 points.

Barring accidents, he is almost a cinch to succeed Colby Scroggin as CRA titlist, and mark him as a certain contender next year in the famous Indianapolis 500.

Hogle's path the next two months is not all a bed of roses, however. With Jones driving exceptionally well of late, there's always the certain contention of such aces as San Diego's Bob McCoy, winner of three Ascot mains and who has finally hit the stride predicted for him; Allen Heath of Northridge, third-ranked driver and also a three-time Ascot winner; motorcycle champion Don Hawley; veteran Hal Minyard; Ned Spah of Ojai and Lynwood's Johnny Gavin, up from a string of victories in the midgets.

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
