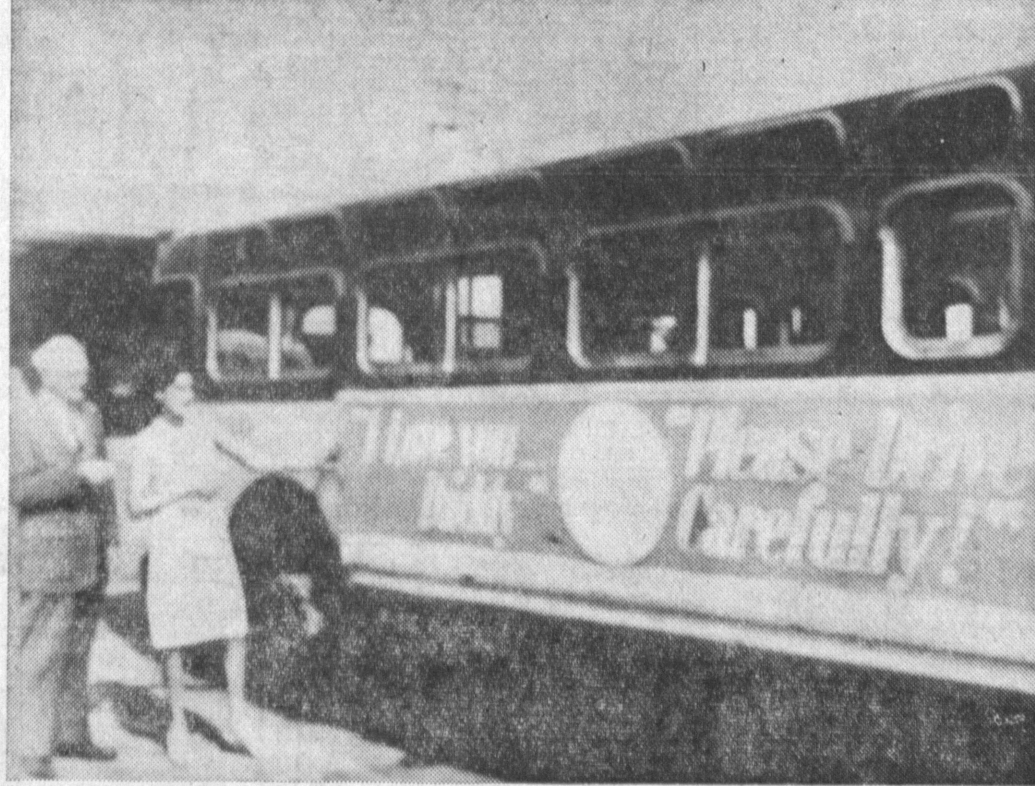

Torrance Student at UCLA Does Heart Research Work

Rudolph Harvey Johnson, 4114 W. 117th St., UCLA student, was one of 15 Southland students scientists to complete summer assignments as student research associates in California Heart Association's continuing statewide "search for gifted minds" in the field of biological research.

The association's third annual Student Research seminar Thursday, Aug. 22) was the final session during which reports on their research projects were shared and discussed by the students, who had been at work in the laboratories of USC, UCLA, Mount Sinai Hospital, Loma Linda University, Pasadena Foundation for Medical Research and Geoscience, Ltd.

A tour of the Human Centrifuge and Space Medicine Laboratory at USC was hosted by Dr. John P. Meehan following the seminar ses-

sion.

"The speed with which medical research will advance in years to come depends on finding and recruiting talented young students to enter the field," declares Sidney S. Sobin, M.D., chairman of California Heart Association's Student Research sub-committee.

Dr. Sobin heads the Loma Linda University Cardiovascular Laboratory at Los Angeles County General Hospital and has had three of the SRA students working with him.

Six of the \$750 grants supporting SRA research projects were provided through Los Angeles County Heart Association funds. Others were funded by California Heart Association and chapters in Long Beach, Orange, Riverside, Santa Barbara, Redwood and Kern Counties Dr. Sobin said.

Family Concert Set for Sunday

A concert of light classics and popular musical comedy selections featuring the 52 young musicians of the Southwest Youth Symphony Orchestra, is scheduled at Roosevelt Park, 7600 Graham Ave., Sunday, Aug. 25, at 4 p.m., announces Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.
