## Hannah Eats Berries with Tongue in Cheek

I am in the midst of putting up a special strawberry jam that is truthfully unbeatable. It puts me in mind of the time several years ago when I was doing the same and some guests dropped in to visit.



Since I always enjoy these people, I was moved to send a jar of the jam home with them when they left. (This was a great concession on my part, for I prize this jam very highly indeed.)

Well, to make a long story, (as Gracie Allen used to say) I later found out that they couldn't abide the usual gummy mess that passes for homemade jam, and they pushed it somewhere back in a closet, and only took it out because there was a local flood and they'd run out of edibles.

Following is the recipe for this delight, and you may imagine their joy when they finally tasted it.

**GOURMET COOKERY SELF-TAUGHT**  
Since we in Torrance live on what is really a large

strawberry patch, we ought to take advantage of the freshness and run up a batch or two of strawberry preserves to make the mouth to water and the guests to envy.

Here's an infallible recipe for two pints of jam with no sterilizing, sealing or whatever. Just keep it in the refrigerator.

2 pint boxes of berries (right from the patch!)  
small size berries  
4 cups sugar

juice of one small lemon  
Wash and hull the berries and put them in a large pot. Add the sugar and bring this to a boil, stirring the while to soften the berries and bring out the juice. BOIL four minutes by the clock.

Turn off heat and stir one minute by the clock. Bring to boil once more and boil four minutes by the clock.

Turn off heat and add lemon juice.  
Leave it in the pot and stir it once in a while until it's cool. You can then store it in a quart jar, two pint jars or four cup-size jars. This makes the brightest jam with the brightest flavor, and not glue-y. A gourmet's delight. Do try it once just to say you can do it.

## Sunshine Girls Feted for Service to Aged

Nine Torrance girls were among 31 South Bay girls honored last night for a summer of service to the ill and aged at a tea held at 7 p.m. at the Fairmont Convalesorium, 22617 So. Vermont Ave.

Ranging in age from 13 to 16 the girls are members of the Sunshine Girls volunteer auxiliary.

Each girl has given an average of four hours daily throughout the summer to serving patients at the Convalesorium, a convalescent-geriatric care center.

Patients include post-operative, orthopedic, cardiac and stroke cases as well as elderly people requiring nursing care.

"Our patients need more than medical treatment," said Mrs. Dolores Davidson, director of volunteers and coordinator of patient activities for Convalesoriums of California. "They need a sense of being in the mainstream of life. They need companionship, mental stimulation and something to do. 'The Sunshine Girls take over where the nurses leave off,'" she explained.

Many of the girls joined the auxiliary "just to have something to do." Some were apprehensive of working with the ill and aged. And very few had thought much about the future, according to Mrs. Davidson.

In addition to realizing the importance of their work gaining a deeper understanding of others and themselves, 25 of the 31 girls have decided to pursue a career in nursing.

Because of the girls' growing interest in nursing, special classes in the nursing arts have been instituted.

Mrs. Davidson is assisted in administering the "Sunshine Girls" program by 21-year-old American Airliner hostess Sandra Sinyard. "Sandy," also a volunteer, spends much of her time between flights working at the Convalesorium. A few weeks

ago, she initiated a charm course for the "Sunshine Girls" based on the training she received from the airline.

Presentations last night were made by Robert S. Ives, director of the Convalesorium, and Mrs. Davidson.

Short addresses were given by Ives; Mrs. Mary Bidwell, chief nurse; Dr. Gary Hathaway, and Louise Buffington, R.N., director of volunteers at Long Beach General Hospital.

Special guests included Fred Elg and Harold Kingsch, president and vice president respectively of Convalari-

ums of California.
