ETHELYN mination of noise odors and hazards, and the atmosphere. You would, of course, keep the safety and comfort of your patient uppermost as you do in the nursing care. All of these factors can be adjusted to any situation, such as on a camping trip or in a disaster.

In the home, the room should be conveniently located with some sunshine. The furnishings should be very simple and easy to keep clean, with only the necessary equipment in the room. Harmonious colors that are restful are good if possible as color does have a psychological effect.

Provisions should be made to keep a sick room sanitary at all times. Temperature control will keep the ideal temperature for night and day between 65 degrees F. and 70 degrees F. This may vary according to individual

To improve moisture content of a room, the humidity, place a pan of water on or near a register. For proper ventilation a window in the room should be open a little at the bottom and at the top—the fresh air comes. in at the bottom; the impure air goes out at the top. This will make the room more halthful and give a slight movement to the air which is soothing.

Protect from chilling by using a screen or straight chairs covered with a blanket in the direct path of the air. Sunshine is cheerful but glare should be avoided. Eliminate noise, odors, and hazards. Stop and think what things could cause an accident and take the necessary measures to remove or prevent them.

The atmosphere which is created by you, the nurse, the other members of the family, and visiting friends has a direct influence on the patient. It should be one that is calm, peaceful, pleasant, with words of encouragement. As a nurse your confident manner, and expression of hopefulness and compassion will help to give the uplifted feeling needed, just as the dedicated nurse in the hospital lets her patients know she cares as she performs her many duties skillfully. This is the real spirit of nursing.

It goes beyond meeting the immediate needs of the patient. Consider the needs of him as a whole, physically, mentally, emotionally, spiritually, instead of just a person with a specific di-

Florence Nighingale, the English nurse, known for her reforms in nursing recognized this need. In a hospital you often hear such expressions as TLC (tender loving care); empathy, the ability to project oneself into the situation of the one who is ill; compassion, and the Golden Rule.

One can acquire some of the necessary skills of nursing for use in their home even without training, and combined with the spirit of nursing can meet the problems of illness with confidence. For the women who have the ability of nursing the reward are great whether she is a mother who has helped her child to recover, or the trained nurse, who in a day's work sees a
