

Hockey Association Has Busy Weekend

The Olympic Minor Hockey Association had a busy week-end with games scheduled Friday and Saturday evenings and Sunday morning at the Olympic Ice Arena on Western Ave.

Friday evening, Nov. 8, the Pasadena Stingrays met the Olympic Red Wings and the less said about that the better. The Pee Wee teams lined up and were introduced — the Stingrays with 13 icemen and the Red Wings with 11 icemen. Referee was Jim Burnett.

The Red Wings, who had shown such promise in their past two games, just didn't seem to have the spark this time; and the fans who came to cheer them on were disappointed to witness a below-par and, at times, a somewhat disorganized team. The Pasadena Stingrays swept to a 9 to 1 victory, scoring within the first five minutes of the game. The only goal made by the Olympic Red Wings is credited to Eddie Feist (13). Although the teams showed good sportsmanship by cheering each other at the end of the game, this was one time when the Red Wings were glad to see the icemen go. An unsched-

uled practice session for the Pee Wees was set up for Saturday.

November 9, Saturday evening, brought the Olympic Bruins and the Culver City Bantams together. These boys are between the ages of 10 and 13. The Olympic Bruins had a line-up of seven icemen with 11 icemen for the Culver City team. Due to lack of equipment, there are only nine players listed for the Olympic Bruins. This doesn't offer coach Bob Edwards much of an opportunity for substitutions or give the players much chance for a breather, considering that six of them have to be on the ice during the 20 minute periods of the game. The money raised from the sale of discount tickets, which may be purchased from any member of the Olympic Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) will go to buy additional equipment, as well as pay for ice time at Olympic Ice Arena, where the boys play and practice. Culver City Bantams took this one with a score of 10 to 2. Referees were Jim Burnett and Doug Middleton.

While the Bantam teams were playing locally Satur-



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day night, the Olympic Juniors, known as the Olympic Maple Leafs, traveled to Culver City to meet the Juniors of that arena. The game was played at a fast pace with some good passing by both teams. The final score was 7 to 3 in favor of Culver City.

El Camino Warriors Face Blue Devils Valley College Saturday

Still in contention for a first-division berth but eliminated from any possible bowl nomination, El Camino College takes its final road trip of the 1963 season Saturday night when the Warriors travel to Los Angeles Valley College.

El Camino, noticeably affected by three successive defeats and dropped below .500 (2-3) in the Metropolitan Conference race, will attempt to score its fifth straight win over the Monarchs, who this year have experienced one of the toughest campaigns in the school's history.

Warrior coach Ken Swearingen has tentatively decided to start southpaw Phil Pomeroy at quarterback, although the two alternates—Bobby Johnson and Pat Pagett—are sure to see considerable action if Pomeroy falters.

For the hosts, coach George Ker will go with freshman Harold Maxham, a 5-8, 150-pound sparkplug.

El Camino's starting backfield will consist of wingback Bill Moran, halfback Paul Carmichael and fullback Daryl Wilson, the Warriors' lone all-conference prospect.

Valley will counter with halfback Phil Culotta, fullback Charles Butler and flanker Bob Delgado.

The Monarchs, who were 1-8 last season and are carrying a similar record this year, have a smooth functioning offense which is capable of riddling any opposing defense. Their defense, however, leaves much to be desired.

Blue Devils Clobber Lakewood

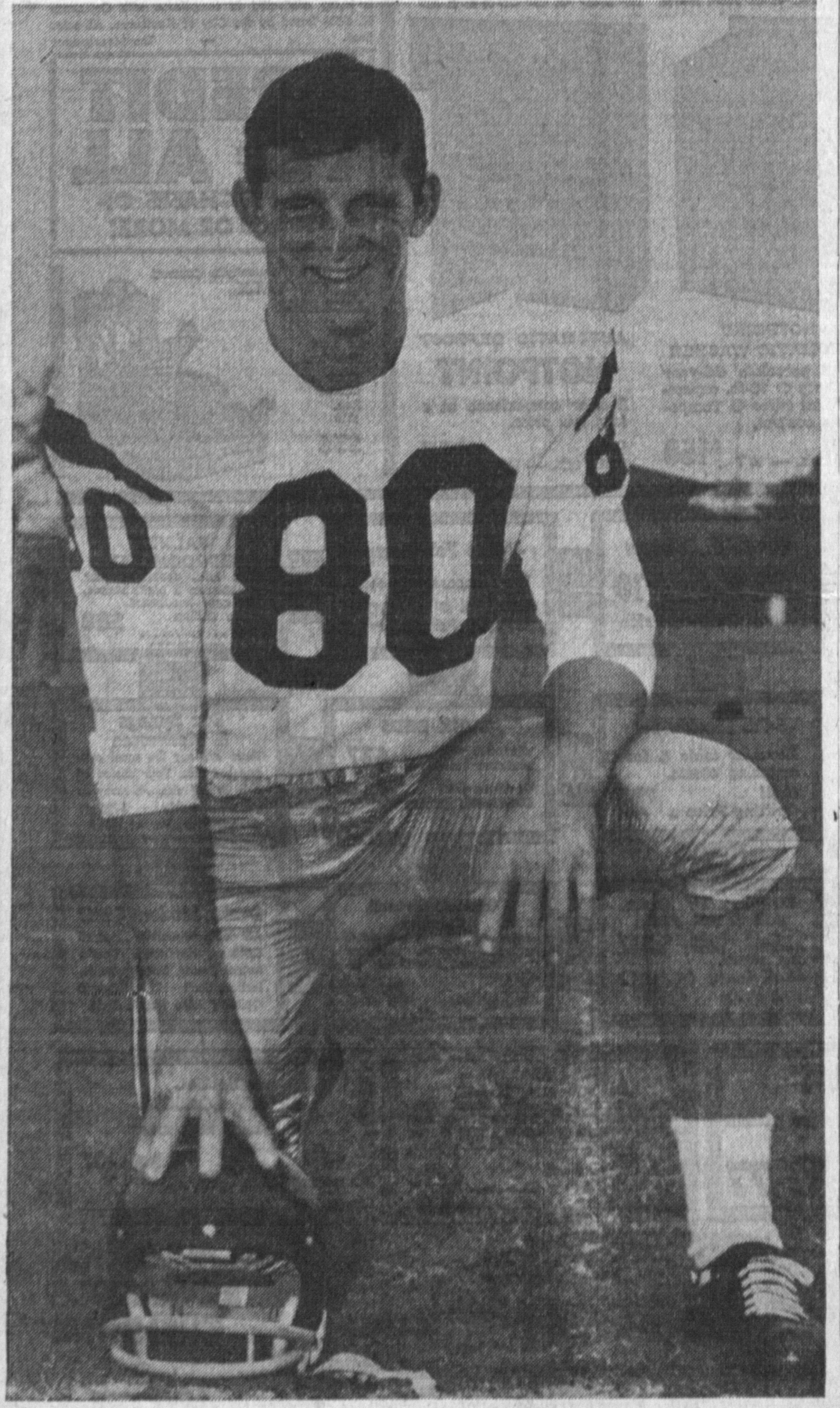

Foyt, Jones Enter Ascot Grand Prix

Indianapolis winners Parnelli Jones of Torrance and A. J. Foyt of Houston, Tex., who traded victories in recent U.S. Auto Club 30-lap sprint car races at Ascot Park, top the early entries for the 23rd Thanksgiving night 150-lap midget car Grand Prix on the same half-mile Gardena oval.

This is the traditional classic of the 110 Offys that was started in 1934 at old Gilmore Stadium in Hollywood and revived in 1955 by J. C. Agajanian after the famed Fairfax-Beverly plant had been torn down for television center.

Foyt is one of three Indianapolis champions to win the Turkey Night marathon, scoring victories at Ascot Park in 1960 and 1961.

The late Billy Vukovich won in 1948 at Gilmore Stadium and Johnnie Parsons in 1955 the year Agajanian revived it at the former Gardena Speedway.

The race was later moved to large Ascot Park and its fast half-mile dirt track.

Billy Cantrell of Anaheim, who seems to take a delight in whipping the Indianapolis stars, is the defending champion.

Twenty-four fastest drivers from qualifying time trials start the 150-lap Grand Prix.

Only two other races will be run during the Nov. 23 holiday night speedfest the three-lap trophy dash and 15-lap semi-main.

Entries close Nov. 21.
