

Two bandits with an electronic age approach to the old armed robbery routine held up a branch of Marina Federal Savings and Loan located at 170th St. and Hawthorne Blvd., Friday and escaped with more than \$9,000, sheriff's deputies reported.

The gunmen, both described as being in their middle 50's and neatly dressed in business suits, used a small walkie-talkie type radio transmitter to summon their getaway car investigators theorize.
