Area Water Level Will **Be Stable** Levels in County water bas-

ins serving Torrance are expected to remain about the same as last year, despite a forecast of lower levels throughout most of the rest of County, according to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.


Hahn said statistics compiled by M. E. Salsbury, chief engineer for the County Flood Control District, indicate that the 1963-64 water year will be second successive one in which amounts of rainfall have been below normal.

Well levels throughout most of the County are expected to be lower this year than in the fall of 1963. The exception is the costal plain area, including Torrance, the Peninsula, and West Long Beach. Levels in Inglewood, Hawthorne, and Venice coast-al area will be slightly lower, said Hahn.
