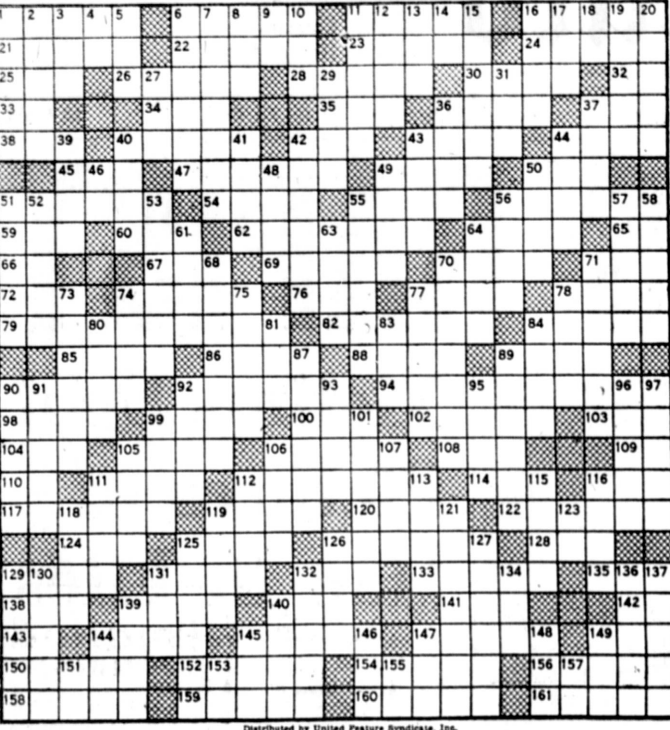

Underwater Safety Class Set for Fall

A 10-week underwater search and recovery course for public safety officers will be offered by California State College at Long Beach with weekly Saturday meetings from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. beginning Sept. 19.

The institute is designed for policemen, firemen, life guards and other public safety personnel," Harold K. Becker, assistant professor of police science and administration and coordinator of the institute, said.

The need for trained public safety personnel who can properly carry out the highly skilled techniques of underwater search and recovery, photography, compass bearings, investigations and salvage is becoming more and more recognized.

The course will include instruction and practice in skin diving and underwater breathing gear, night diving, techniques of underwater search, recovery, photography and salvage.

Instructors will include Lt. Comdr. Leslie Thompson (USN, Ret.), a former Navy diver and now consultant to law enforcement agencies.

and Dr. Glen Egstrom, chairman of the Diving Control Board at UCLA. Instruction will be conducted in classrooms and pool at Cal-State Long Beach and in the ocean. Tuition for the non-credit course is \$65. SCUBA tanks and regulators will be supplied by the institute. The student will provide his own face mask, fins, snorkel and weights.

Anderson To Attend Dedication

Lt. Gov. Glenn M. Anderson will be the featured speaker at dedication ceremonies for the John F. Kennedy Memorial in downtown Torrance, according to Orin P. "Bud" Johnson, assistant city manager.

Johnson said ceremonies would be held at 2:30 Monday afternoon, Sept. 14.

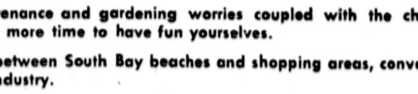

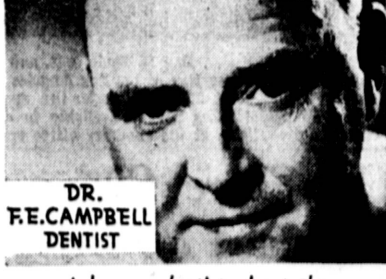
