

218 Players Out For South Drills

Wholesale changes are being made this year in South High's football program under the direction of new head coach Ken Swift.

Swift, a former assistant varsity coach at South Pasadena High, has 218 players under his wing in workouts which began yesterday.

Eight lettermen will return from last year's winless Spartan eleven, but Swift indicates he is not counting on the monogram winners.

THE WING T will be installed by Swift as South, and he feels the change in offense will all but void the importance of the lettermen.

Swift believes his strength rests in the backfield, due to number of players, and in the line, due to strength of several individuals.

At end, Swift is counting on John Bebling, Bob Clark, and Fred Meyers. Gene Cooper, Randy Lee, Carl Lindgren and Dan Birmingham are tackle candidates.

Tom Piper and Victor Farmer are top guard candidates while Phil Hortzog all but has the center position sewed up.

In the backfield, Swift must decide between Scott Christensen, Greg Douglas and Dale Hewitt at quarterback. Charley Phillips and Ken Wegge are vying for the fullback slot while Bob Weeks and Ken Jones are prime half-back selections.

At wingback, Swift will probably go with Mark Klusmo or Ralph Gabin, a transfer from Missouri.

Swift again artes defending champ Santa Monica as the class of the Bay League. He ranks Mira Costa a close second with South, Redondo, Hawthorne and Palos Verdes fighting for third.

HE BELIEVES the Spartans will be in every game this year, adding that he has been impressed with the attitude of his players.

South will open its non-league campaign on Friday, Sept. 25, against El Segundo.

70 Gridders Report For ECC Workouts

Short on quantity but seemingly long on talent, a 70-man El Camino College football team is currently working out under the critical eye of head coach Ken Swearingen.

"It's the smallest turn-out I can remember," the mentor observed—and Swearingen's over-all view of Warrior

teams is a long one. The All-Bay League whiz from Redondo Beach suited up with the Warriors for the first time in 1952, gaining Metropolitan Conference and All-Southern Cal JC plaudits during his two years on the playing field. In 1957 the COP alum joined the ECC coaching staff, taking over the reins of head coach in 1961.

Though short numerically, the Warriors will field the "biggest line in years," according to the mentor.

Line Coach Bill Vincent is being greeted by something other than the traditional El Camino 173-pound guard. His weighty subjects include 275-pound letterman Rich Cooper, a tackle from Hawthorne, and Dan Dye, also a tackle and also from Hawthorne, weighing in as a 245-pound letterman.

Greeting end coach Don Jurk, himself a former Warrior flanker, are a number of strong prospects, including letterman John Joseph, who joined the Warriors via Bishop Montgomery High, Steve Bucher from Inglewood, Don Smith from Inglewood, and Edward Estrada, North.

Back coach Vince McCullough welcomes a wealthy

crew of quarterbacks, including three lettermen. Returnees are Phil Pomeroy, Mt. Carmel; Bob Johnson, Redondo and Pat Paget, El Segundo. Strong prospects in their freshman year will be Lawndale's All-Pioneer League Richard Heath, Leuzinger's Ed Pease, and Hawthorne's 1962 All-Bay League quarterback, Bill Daquila.

One or more of the quarterbacks is likely to be groomed to fill vacancies in other backfield spots.

At fullback, the Warriors welcome the return of stand-out letterman Daryl Wilson, a 200-pound North High alum.

Promising halfbacks include Tim Mortensen, All-Pioneer Leaguer from El Segundo, lettermen Bill Humphries, Lawndale, Dan Jordan, '61, from Morningside, and Otto Rieger, whose 'feets' accounted for many an extra point via the kicking route last season. Also impressive at half is Chuck Woods, Mira Costa's all-league running back.

Only Everett and Tideman are non-soners in the group. They are both Juniors.

Tranham believes guards Richard Rodriguez and Jim Cooper, center Phil Hull and tackle Terry Lewis may move up to help the varsity this season.

Lawndale, with the acquisition of quarterback Mike Battles, who has transferred from El Segundo, is ranked by Tranham as the Pioneer League's top team.

ORDINANCE NO. 1524
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING THE AMOUNT OF BOND NECESSARY TO MEET THE TOTAL ESTABLISHED EXPENDITURES OF FISCAL YEAR 1964-65 LESS THE AMOUNTS RAISED BY REVENUES COLLECTED OR TRANSFERRED FROM SOURCES OTHER THAN GENERAL PROPERTY TAXES.

WHEREAS, on August 25, 1964, the City of Torrance did pass Resolution No. 84-170, which amended Resolution No. 84-169, and which authorized the annual budget for the fiscal year 1964-65 and appropriated for said fiscal year the sum of \$1,415,677 for the purposes of the City of Torrance, and

WHEREAS, the amounts raised by revenues collected or transferred from sources other than general property taxes on secured real and personal property total \$882,521.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Torrance, California, by and through its duly authorized Board of Finance, do hereby adopt the following:

- A. That the amount of money necessary to meet the total estimated amount of the City's general municipal obligations for the fiscal year 1964-65 is \$1,415,677.00.
- B. For the purpose of the sum of \$1,415,677.00.
- C. To pay the obligations of the City of Torrance for the fiscal year 1964-65, the City Council hereby authorizes and directs the City Auditor to issue the amount of \$1,415,677.00 in the form of bonds, notes, debentures, or other indebtedness of the City, and to deposit the same in the City's general fund.
- D. For the purpose of the sum of \$1,415,677.00.
- E. For the purpose of the sum of \$1,415,677.00.
- F. For the purpose of the sum of \$1,415,677.00.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption for the reason that the ordinance determining the amount of money necessary to be raised by the City of Torrance for the fiscal year 1964-65 is a matter of public concern and the City Auditor has advised that the City's general fund is insufficient to meet the City's general municipal obligations for the fiscal year 1964-65.

Section 3. The Mayor and City Clerk shall execute and attest to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Free-Press, a semi-weekly newspaper printed, published and circulated in the City of Torrance.
