Committee of Assembly Told Of Big Jumps

Once again the cry against
"taxation without representation" is being raised in the
land. And from all indications, this time there appears
to be some truth behind this
accusation, now being hurled
at many of our special governmental districts.

This was brought out dramatically at a recent two-day
hearing of the Assembly
Municipal and County Government Committe. An unhappy taxpayer who bought
a summer cabin site in the
high Sierras described the tax
H-bomb which hit him in
1982. Over the 10-year perlod from the time he purchased it and built a cabin,
his property taxes increased
gradually from \$55 per year
to \$82 in 1961. His 1962 tax
bill was for \$340—up a roaring 314 per cent in one year.

The cause, he soon found,
was a newly created county
water district, which had
been set up without his
knowledge or vote. This district, it appeared, had
promptly authorized the issuance of \$795.000 in general
obligation bonds, again without knowledge or vote of the
property owners.

A SPOKESMAN from the Attorney-General's office explained to the committee and the disheartened taxpayer how-it-had been possible legally to saddle him with this quadrupled tax burden. Until 1951, the record shows, state law relating to the establishment of county water districts required a minimum population in each such district of 300 people, but the law was changed then to delete this provision entirely. The result has been to encourage land promoters to create many such districts so as to up their profits at the expense of taxpayers in the districts.

This spokesman said that this particular district had been created by a land promoter interested in developing the area. He had complied with the law by filing a petition with the county board of supervisors which contained six valid signatures, The six signatures were those of the promoter, his wife, and four of his employes.

Since this law requires no direct and specific notice to each property owner within the district boundaries, formation of the new district was approved by the supervisors, and an election was held at which the bond issue was approved. Thus the taxpayer was effectively denied representation with respect to the levy on his property.

THE ATTORNEY-General's THE ATTORNET-Generals representative concluded by saying, "We find once again that a law which once had safeguards against exploitation by promoters has been amended to be an ideal vehicle for the money-short developer."

cle for the money-short developer."

The committee consultant reported that there are increasing indications that bond money is being used to provide improvements in subdivisions which previously were considered a natural part of the promoter's development costs. His report recommended: 1) that a debt limitation in terms of a fixed percentage of the value of land and improvements in a district be set; 2) that the district securities commission review and approve all promotional bonds in districts having less than 300 population; and 3) that certain existing provisions of law which encourage speculative land development be repealed.

The committee was also warned that a state agency.

The committee was also warned that a state agency, the Mt. San Jacinto Winter Park Authority which has issued \$8.15 million in revenue bonds, appears headed for trouble, because its cable tramway project is not producing enough revenue to retire the bonds.
