Crisp Air Ushers In Baking Season
The cool, crisp days of autumn mark the return of the baking season in many families-and few aromas nating from an oven full of cookien.
Cookies add zest to home-packed school lunches, as well as desserts, and make excellent holiday giftsespecially when packaged in original and unusual container
ere are some of my favorites:
$11 / 4$ cups butter or $\quad 11 / 2$ teaspoons cinnamon
margarine
$11 / 2$ teaspoons allspice
$1 / 3$ cup brown sugar
5 cups sifted flour
$11 / 2$ cups molasses
$1 / 2$ cup boiling water
$\begin{array}{ll}1 & \text { egg } \\ 2 \text { teaspoons ginger } & 4 \text { teaspoons baki } \\ & 1 / 2 \text { teaspoon salt. }\end{array}$
Heat oven to 375 degrees $F$. Using an electric mixer cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Add molasses and egg. Mix until well blended. Sift spices and 2 cups flour together. Add to creamed mixture alternately with boiling water. Add another cup flour and mix well. Sift remaining 2 cups flour with the baking soda and salt. Stir thoroughly into the batter. Drop by tablespoonfuls on baking sheet, several inches apart. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F, for about 10 minutes, until cookies are a good brown color. Cool thoroughly before storing in cookie jar. Yields about 4 dozen $4^{\prime \prime}$ cookies. -mixed an easy bite-size bit that is chocolate and white -mixed with nuts, try this sweet and salty snack.

Heat oven to 375 degrees F . Mix thoroughly using the electric mixer, shortening, sugar, eggs and stir into shortening mixture. Divide dough into sour (4) parts. Into firsi part blend $1 / 3$ of chocolate; pat onto $10^{\prime \prime}$ square on a baking sheet cut into strips $21 / 2$ " x $1 / 4$ ". Into second part, blend other $1 / 2$ of chocolate; make a roll $1^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter; cut into slices about $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ thick; place on baking sheet. Pat third part of dough into a $10^{\prime \prime}$ square on a baking sheet; cut in strips $2 \frac{1}{2}$ "" x $1 / 4$ ". Pat fourth part of dough into 10 " square on baking sheet; cut into triangles with $1^{\prime \prime}$ sides. Bake each 6 to 8 minutes. Recut on scored lines and break apart. Cool. Mix with nuts.

Serve these at an open house for the young crowd. They're scrumptious.

CHERRY COCONUT CHOCOLATE DROPS
Heat oven to 375 degrees $F$. Stir into 1 package of chocolate chip fudge brownie mix 1 egg $1 / 4$ cup chopped maraschino cherries and the package of chocolate chips. Shape into $1^{1 \prime}$ balls and dip each ball into slightly beaten egg white; roll in shredded coconut. Place on lightly greased baking sheet and bake 10 to 12 minutes. Yelds 2 to $21 / 2$ dozen.
Crushed peanut brittle gives a buttery crisp crunchy texture to a variation of chocolate chip cookies.
