McDaniel attributed the growth of reading by chil-dren today to the fact that more children can read pro-ficiently nowadays than in previous generations and the fact that vicarious experiences and interests generated by television are coupled with the burgeoning availability of attractive well-writ-ten literature.

He pointed out that the strength of the literature pro-gram in Torrance schools lies in the ready availability to each child of "quality, attrac-tive literature for his immediate interests and ability."

Last year, McDaniel noted, the average Torrance teacher checked out of the Educa-tional Materials Building 314 library books, 286 supplemen 47 other audiovisual items in addition to the approximate 400 state textbooks used in
