

# Low Injury Rate Proves New Grid Safety Project

One of the most dramatic protections to some 10,000 high school athletes in Los Angeles is contained in a very undramatic sounding program administered through the Los Angeles City Board of Education and known as Project Mouthguard.

Directed by the schools' Department of Dental Health and participated in by 250 volunteer private practicing dentists, the program originally aimed at preventing tooth loss and mouth injuries among football players. Not only was this objective met with spectacular success during the first season the program went into full force but also there are indications that a very real gain may have been made in reducing neck injuries and concussion type head injuries.

IT ALL BEGAN when in 1962 the rules committee of the National Football Alliance adopted a mandatory regulation that each player wear an intraoral mouth and tooth protector. That year school dentists and the Los Angeles Dental Society, after studying and rejecting many commercially available mouth protectors, launched the current Project Mouthguard which

calls for custom fitting of every football player with a mouthguard tailored to his specific needs. Dentists in private practice volunteer their services in taking impressions and making casts. School dentists make the protective devices from these casts. An emergency replacement service is provided so that any boy whose mouthguard is lost is supplied a custom-made replacement within 24 hours.

ACCORDING to school insurance records, prior to 1962 from 80 to 300 boys a year lost one or more teeth in high school football. During the 1962 season when mouthguards were first required, about half the players had been fitted with the custom-made protectors. Of some 20 boys who lost one or more teeth during play that year, only two were among those wearing custom fitted mouthguards. The following year all city high school football players had been supplied with custom guards. Not a single tooth was lost among boys who wore them. Six boys who lost teeth during play were not wearing their mouthguards when the injury occurred.

Serendipity entered the scene when a five-year study of mouthguard use among

football players at Notre Dame University was published in the "Journal of the American Dental Association," September, 1964. This study documents the protection mouthguards afford players whose faulty tooth or jaw alignment predisposes them to injurious shock of the head and neck. Brain concussion was prevented through the use of mouthguards among players who had long histories of many concussions suffered during football games. Pinched nerves from prior neck injuries were relieved. It was pointed out that the slight realignment achieved through use of the guard was sufficient to create a cushion to protect against this kind of injury.

UPON READING the Notre Dame study, Los Angeles school dentists checked with the schools' insurance department and found that not only had no oral injuries occurred to mouth-protected high school players here in 1963 but also that no head or neck injuries had been reported.

While insurance statistics on these injuries are incomplete, it appears that a simple device and the quiet dedicated effort of many dentists may have made football a much safer sport for Los Angeles youngsters.

# Hearing on Park Plan Scheduled

A public hearing on a proposal for the City of Lomita to assume responsibility for Lomita Park will be held before the Board of Supervisors Dec. 17.

Lomita seeks to operate the park under its own Parks and Recreation Department. City Administrator Stanley Greene has said the city can save money by operating the park itself.

The hearing, slated for 9:30 a.m., is to determine if the park is local in character and therefore subject to the jurisdiction of the newly formed city, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The Los Angeles County Parks and Recreation Department has recommended transfer of the park to Lomita, Chace added.

If the transfer is approved, the agreement will provide that the site be used forever as a park.

# Legislator Renews Pledge To Vote for No New Taxes

The phrase "regressive taxes" is being used again in magazine articles, newspaper features, speeches by television commentators who read "idiot boards" because they cannot memorize their lines like good actors should, radio broadcasts, and in oratory inflicted on people who cannot find the fire escape.

My constituents (people who live in the 46th Assembly District, whether or not they are registered voters) have been telephoning me, writing me letters, and stopping me on the street, asking how I stand on regressive taxes.

The answer is: I am against regressive taxes. I always have been opposed to regressive taxes, and I intend to vote against regressive taxes during the long, general session of the California State Legislature, which begins at noon, Jan. 4, 1965, and will last at least well into June, 1965.

BEFORE I go any further, it might be well for me to explain what regressive taxes are. If you have access to the large, thick, heavy, expensive dictionary found in most schools and in all public libraries, you will find several definitions of "regressive," "regress," and "regression."

Let us start with the intransitive verb, "regress." It is derived from the Latin language, and means "to go back." The word "regression" is a noun which means "the act of going back." The word "regressive" is an adjective, which has several meanings. When used to modify the noun "taxes," it means taxes which are recommended by people who want to go back.

For example, when there were bills before the California State Legislature increasing the state taxes on cigarettes, the California State branch of the American Federation of Labor (A.F.L.) sent authorized representatives to testify against the bills taxing cigarettes before the Assembly Committee on Revenue and Taxation, of which I have been a member for 14 years. Some of the high-salaried school people testified in favor of the increasing of the state tax on cigarettes on the ground that the cigarette tax helped the dear little school children in the tax-supported, public schools.

THE AMERICAN Federation of Labor testified that in 1923, I was a Midshipman,

greivous, that it placed the heaviest burden on hourly workers, whether or not such employes paid by the hour belonged to the A.F.L., or not. The Committee on Industrial Organization, commonly called the "C.I.O.," sent delegates who also said the proposed new cigarette tax was regressive. This was before the shotgun wedding performed between the A.F.L. and the C.I.O., and before the Teamsters got thrown out of the A.F.L.

In addition to the testimony given by union labor leaders, there were witnesses representing manufacturers, wholesalers, jobbers, and retail merchants, all of whom opposed the proposed State tax on cigarettes. For some reason, those employes did not use the word "regressive," but they used other words which were much more harsh.

During the long, drawn-out committee hearings, I argued that if we were going to increase the tax on cigarettes, we should be logical and raise the tax on cigars, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco, and snuff, but I was ruled out of order. I believe the chairman of the committee smoked a pipe, the vice-chairman smoked cigars, one member chewed "cut plug" tobacco which was made in little square cakes with a tin snuff stuck into the cake, and one member dipped snuff.

THIS IS not anti-Democratic Party propaganda. In those days, the Governor was registered as a Republican, and the overwhelming majority of State Senators and Members of the Assembly were Republicans. Anyhow, the bills increasing taxes on cigarettes died, either in the committee or on the floor of the Assembly. I voted "NO" in committee and if the bills reached the floor of the Assembly, I certainly voted "NO."

Many, many years ago, probably 100 or 200 years ago, the Parliament of England enacted a law taxing glass window panes in homes. The English, Irish, Scottish, and Welsh people were more intelligent than the Parliament of England. Those who were in either the lower or the middle economic groups simply filled their windows with bricks, stones, or boards and did not have to pay the tax on window panes. I know this is true because I saw houses without window panes in Glasgow, Edinburgh, and London when I was visiting England and Scotland in 1923. I was a Midshipman,

U.S. Navy, an authorized leave from the U.S.S. Arkansas. Unfortunately, I did not have papers authorizing me to visit Wales and Ireland.
