Whip eggs and sugar. Par-tially melt butter and stir into the egg-sugar mixture. Add the lemon juice, peel and almond drops. Sift in flour with amonium carbon-ate and cardemomme and blend all together.

Cover the dough and let it set in the refrigerator un-til next day. Then roll it out on a floured board to about pencil thick rolls. Cut in 4 inch lengths and form into rings, ends crossing each other.

Bake the rings in lard un til light brown color and drain them on paper towels

PFEFFERNEUSSE FRUIT CAKES



In a three quart sauce pan combine sugar, butter, syrup, coffee. Simmer 5 minutes. Sift together flour, soda, cinnamon, salt, nut-meg. Grind cherries, raisins, walnuts. Set aside. Add two unbeaten eggs, and extract to sugar-butter mixture; mix to sugar-outter mixture; mix well. Stir in dry ingredients, then fruit mixture. Chill four hours or overnight. Shape into one inch balls with floured hands. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 18 minutes. Makes about
