A happy P.S. to the letter an-nounced the birth of a son, on Dec. 28. The 8 lb. 4 oz. young man has been named Samuel Pa-trick Edward Thomsen.)

Thinking back over the past year to our last Christ-mas "catch up" letter, it seems that we have again spent an eventful and ex-citing year in Viet Nam. Much of what we have heard and seen "on the front" we're euro you front", we're sure you have experienced vicariousfront' ly through newspapers and radio. However, here is some news that perhaps the New York Times overlooked.

In July, Sam was re-assigned to Hue (pron. way) as the principal offi-cer. Although our life in Saigon had been full and interesting, the opportunity to live in a smaller and quieter community was in-deed appealing. This was, of course, in addition to what it meant to Sam's career in terms of added experience and opportunity.


