Dianas 'Toy Loan' Project Recognized

Toy Loan program, which was inaugurated in Redondo Beach, July 27, 1938 by the Redondo Dianas continues to receive the support of this group of young matrons, who this week are delivering many new toys to the Toy Loan building in North Redondo. Mrs. RayMiss Magnhild Myron. They d Williams is Toy Loan chairman.

The building at Perry Park, 2310 Rockefeller Lane, Redondo, was built for the city by the Dianas in 1950, who also provide the funds to maintain it.

This program is under the Redondo Beach Recreation Commission authorized by the County Board of Supervisors, Bureau of Public Assistance.

Mrs. Williams has an-

nounced that the program has been so successful in the character building of the children, who borrow the toys, and the senior citizens, who repair them, that assistance from the "War on Poverty" program will be received. One of the main aims of

Toy Loan is character building. Children fill out an application and borrowers card, then are permitted to borrow a toy for one week If returned on time and in satisfactory condition the child may borrow another one. After the child has 15 satisfactory marks he may

borrow a wheel toy, such as a bicycle, wagon, or pedal car. After 20 satisfactory returns, a girl may choose a doll to keep and a boy something from the honor shelf. The doll must be brought back three times for a check up to make sure the new owner is being a good mother. The Dianas furnish all the honor toys. This character building

program helps to teach the child promptness, by bring-ing the toys back on time, honor, responsibility, clean-liness and care of public

The toys are sanitized after every loan. Mrs. Woodrow K. Thames is the toyrarian for Redondo Beach. All toys are obtained through donations. The Toy Loan is open Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, 1 to 5 p.m. and Saturday morning, 9:30 to 12 peop. 9:30 to 12 noon.
