# For Vacation Voter League Begins City Charter Study

Torrance League of Women Voters members will launch study of the City Charter at a series of meetings next week. Understanding the content of the Charter and the mechanics of city government, the first phase of the study, will be the goal of these meetings, according to Mrs. Howard

Foote, study chairman.

In preparation for the study, League members have written a Charter Digest, a condensation of the decument in lamages. document in layman's lan-guage. The Charter Digest also includes a listing of city commissions and council committees, with a resume of their duties and areas of influence.

Second phase of the study will be a tour of the City Hall, scheduled for Feb. 9. At that time, League mem-bers and their guests will observe city government in operation and receive brief-ings from various city de-partment heads.

Later meetings will be devoted to an in-depth study and discussion of sections of the Charter dealing with commissions, council committees, civil service, and other areas in which members may show particular interest as the study pro-

gresses. An evaluation of the Charter, adopted by the city in 1947, will also be made.

Assisting Mrs. Foote in doing research and preparing materials for the study are Mmes. James Anderson, Parke Bryan, Henry Fink, Jr., David Morrison, and James Pierson.
