Horizons, according to George Lavac, recreational director. With the election of Judge MacFaden and other officers of the board, organization of the self-government of the "city within a city" is complete, Lavac said.

New Horizons is Ray Watt's adult recreation and garden home community which re-cently became the first major Southland adult condominum to elect its own Board of Governors and to turn administrative control over to the residents, Lavac ex-

B of A Plans **New Branch** In Dominguez

Bank of America will establish a branch in the Do-minguez Hills area of southwestern Los Angeles County, it was announced by Vice President James F. Naugh-

Naughton, who is the senthe new branch will offer a full range of banking services to Dominguez Hills residents and businessmen.

The bank has leased 1,520 square feet of space for the branch in a shopping center at 18513 S. Avalon Blvd., he said.

According to a recent re-port made by the Los An-geles County Planning Com-mission, Dominguez Hills is one of three areas in southwestern Los Angeles County most likely to undergo rapid residential development on presently vacant or agricul-tural lands.

NAUGHTON REPORTS the current population is 9,500— a 71 per cent increase over the 1960 census figure. Future residential develop-ments indicate that by 1975 the population will increase to 40,900.

"Despite its present rate of residential and industrial ex-pansion and excellent pros-pects for diversified future growth, Dominguez Hills is without local banking facili-ties," Naughton said.

"This new branch will enable us to provide complete banking service in modern quarters at a location convenient for all."




