Torrance Students to Benefit from

Teachers' Study-Tour in Mexico

"You learn a foreign language much faster when living in the environment." So saying, twelve teachers from Torrance Schools, and their instructor, Mrs. Alba Moesser, joined with other teachers on a three-week trip to Mexico City in August. Under sponsorship of the Ihero Americana University, the group drilled on conversational Spanish three hours each morning, and then used the new language in seeing the sights of Mexico. The consensus among the "students' was that Mexicans talk too fast, and they soon learned several different ways of saying, "Would you kindly say that a little more slowly, por favor?"

Most of the teachers expect to use what they learned as background in teaching Spanish in Torrance this coming year. Making the trip were Mrs. Flora Satt, language teacher at South High; Mr. Craig Kimball, Mmes. Frances Fox, Dorothy Dodson, Helen Carpenter, Sandra Eads, Joan Meagher, Elinor Courtney, Evelyn Carr, Misses Fanny Roth, and Peggy Maddox, elementary school teachers. Also a member of the party, was Mrs. Ethel Lewis, home teacher for many years and now substituting in the high school language classes.

One of the most attractive features of the trip was the opportunity to live in Mexican homes near the University. In most of the homes no English was spoken, giving the Americans real motivation for increasing their vocabularies quickly, A Spanish-American dictionary became a real aid to communication. The visitors were unanimous in complimenting their hosts for courtesy and concern.

Tours were taken by the group on weekends to the many places of interest. Also, the teachers were able to visit public and private schools in Mexico City, and see classes in session, since the Mexican school wear runs without break from February to November.

One teacher's comment was that the transportation phase of a social studies unit took on new importance as she rode buses and taxis everywhere, and realized that about half the people in Mexico City rely on buses to take them to work and everywhere else. Buses are in abundance, and very inexpensive to ride. But to a foreigner, who is accustomed to driving his own car with the aid of a map, it can be an exciting and even shocking experience—especially if you get on the wrong one, or can't see the street signs soon enough to get off, or can't find anyone who understands your pronunciation of street names.

They had fun, they learned about Mexico, its people and its language, and now they are home ready to pass this knowledge on to their students in the Torrance classrooms when school opens Sept. 15.
