Old MacDonald's Farm Comes To Life

For Children at Harbor Hospital

"Down on the farm" is the theme of a patient children's play area sponsored by the Volunteers for Children at Los An-geles County Harbor General Hospital, Torrance.

The play area, nearing completion, will need more women to help as "farm hands" and an appeal for South Bay area women to join the Volunteers for Children for this specific service was issued by Mrs. Roys Ellis, Jr., president.

"The chores won't be slopping pigs, or pitching hay," she said, "but will center in watching over and directing Outpatient Pediatrics in the play areas."

Outpatient pediatrics are child-patients ranging from babes in arms to early teeners, who come to the Clinic for post-operations examinations, allergy shots, and diagnosis, as opposed to inpatients in the children's wards on the sixth floor.

The "farm" is an area reached through the Outpatient Pediatric Clinic's waiting room back exit on the first floor. A cement slab, 18 by 72 feet, is enclosed on four sides, simulating a corral. On one of the walls, the Palos Verdes Community Arts Association members painted murals depicting horses and colts frolicking in a meadow, and at one end wall, a stable with horses' heads sticking out of stalls to watch the children at play.

A specially designed foam rubber turf will be placed on the slab, and on this will be mounted lifelike fiberglass horses, ponies, pigs, roosters, geese and ducks. These are big enough for the children to "ride."

are big enough for the children to hospital and quite often children have to wait long periods before doctors are able to see them," Mrs. Ellis said, "Although we have television for them in the waiting room, they often get restless, break away from parents and wander into areas where they disturb the doctors and their patients. The 'farm' will provide an area where we can keep the waiting children together with something realistic to keep them occupied."

Mrs. Ellis pointed out that the play area is for patient children brought to the Clinic and not an employee or children of visitors baby sitting project.

"We do need more women to help us supervise the children on the 'farm,' ' she added. "Those interested should contact the Volunteer Patient Services at the Hos-

The Volunteers for Children is an adult organization, part of the Volunteer Services of the hospital, celebrating its tenth anniversary.
