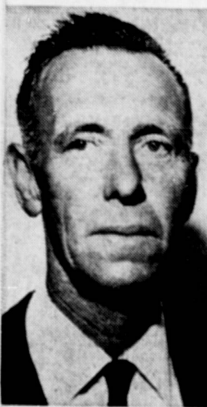

Civic Leader John Kesson Rites Today

Funeral services for John K. Kesson, prominent North Torrance civic leader for many years, were held this morning with Dr. H. H. Richardson of Redondo Beach officiating. Mr. Kesson died early Monday in a Harbor City hospital. He would have been 64 Friday.

Although born in Denver, Colo., he was brought to California by his parents when just an infant, and had lived in this area most of his life.

He was twice president of the North Torrance Civic Improvement Association, one of the most active in the city until its disbandment last year. His activity with the group continued until assets of the association had been presented to local charitable and welfare organizations.

Mr. Kesson also was an active leader in the North Torrance Lions Club and in the Torrance Red Cross chapter, and was a member of the National Police and Sheriff's Association.

The is survived by his widow Ramona, 2013 W. 182nd St.; a son, Kenneth; daughters Gloria Noble and Joyce Gamba; sisters Dorothy White and June Jackson; and five grandchildren.

Interment was scheduled in Green Hills Memorial Park, San Pedro.

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Board Adopts Rules for New Teachers' Council

Rules for the establishment of a nine-man negotiating council for teachers in Torrance were approved by the Board of Education Monday evening during a meeting at West High.

The negotiating council, which is designed to give teachers' organizations a chance to "meet and confer" with the Board of Education on matters of employer-employee relations, is required under provisions of Assembly Bill 1474 (The Winton Act) approved in the 1965 session of the State Legislature.

One Torrance teacher organization, the American Federation of Teachers (AFT), will not be represented unless the organization changes its own policies.

The AFT objected to a requirement of verification of its membership through an independent audit. Glenn Schwindemann, president of the AFT local chapter, told trustees AFT would not submit to an audit of its membership because "you will use our numbers against us."

He asked trustees to use a payroll deduction procedure approved two weeks ago as the basis for verifying membership.

Schwindemann also charged the AFT has "had no chance to grow in this district because of the attitude of certain individuals." He quickly qualified the statement and told board members he felt AFT had received fair treatment from the board.

THE TORRANCE Education Association, which represents more than 90 per cent of all teachers and administrators in the district, supports the requirement for verification of membership. Darold Kusch, president of TEA, said the law provides for "fair and reasonable" verification procedures and added the requirement for the number of members "is reasonable."

Rules for the new council provide for an organization

to submit its membership list to an independent auditor for verification of the number of members. Names of members are not required by the board.

HEART OF THE negotiating council is a provision that the board of education, the superintendent or his designated representatives must "meet and confer upon request with the official representatives of employe organizations with regard to matters relating to employment conditions, employer-employee relations, definition of educational objectives, the administration of courses and curriculum, the selection of textbooks, and other aspects of the instructional program."

Provisions of the local policy are subject to approval by the County Counsel, who serves as legal counsel for school districts.

Approved a request from the Recreation Department for \$3,000 to install curbs and sidewalks on the 186th Street side of Freeway Park and to begin preliminary planning for the park.

Re-imposed a six-months building moratorium prohibiting new construction or demolition of existing structures within the Meadow Park Redevelopment Area.

Earmarked \$150,000 in funds for preliminary planning and design of a new office building in the civic center and authorized City Manager Edward J. Ferraro to solicit proposals from architects to design the structure. Funds for planning the second phase of Joslyn Center also were earmarked by councilmen.
