When a Torrance Police Officer is assigned to the de-partment's motorcycle squad, he isn't just handed a set of keys and a book of traffic ci-tations and told to go to work.

Until recently, the motor-cycle officer was trained at the Los Angeles Police Acad-emy. Now, however, Torrance conducts its own motorcycle training course

Officers who will be assigned to the motorcycle squad first must undergo nearly 90 hours of training—salmost three weeks—in the fundamentals of handling a motorcycle, care and cleaning the machine and Torrance the machine, and Torrance police policy and procedure. The intensive training is

The intensive training is designed to develop "well rounded traffic officers and safe motorcycle riders." The course is divided into three phases: soft surface motorcycle riding, hard surface riding, and classroom instruction

The average Torrance Traf-fic officer will spend between 70 and 80 hours on a motorcycle during the training per-iod. About half the time is devoted to handling the machine on a hard surface such as a street. The remainder of the time is spent learning fundamentals of handling a motorcycle on a soft surface.


