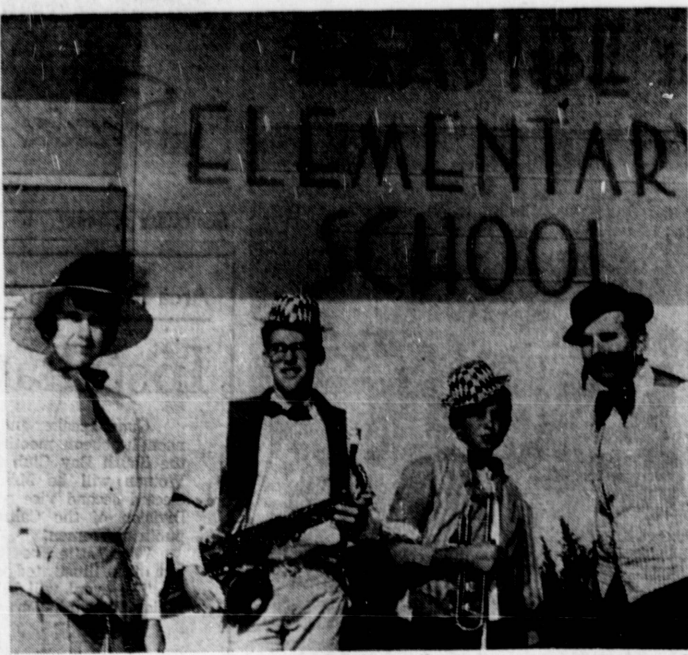
The program will feature a talk "Books for Young People" by Mrs. C. Campbell.
