Mrs. McAilister, a regis-tered nurse in addition to her status in the depart-ment, originated the idea of having RNs as instructors during a month training program, one day a week from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"The training program is planned for members of the

adult volunteer groups, Auxiliary and Volunteers for Children," Mrs. McAllister said, "It will provide instructions and practice in selected nursing procedures. There procedures and func-tion are based on the Har-bor Hospital Volunteer definition of duties and respon-sibilities. Under the direc-tion of a Registered Nurse, the volunteer learns to assist in nursing care to patients. Each day there will be lectures, demonstrations, and practice in the class-room, followed by practical experience under direct supervision on a ward.

"Two objectives will be attained. First, the Volunteer will be better able to provide patient care within the scope of the volunteer capability, and secondly, she will thus be able to act as consultant to incoming vol-unteers and assist in teach-ing," she added.


