Harbor Hospital Pins First Graduates In

Volunteer Teaching Class

Nineteen South Bay women were honored at Los Angeles County General Hospital Tuesday as the first group to complete a specialized course in training in patient care for new members of the hospital's important volunteer groups.

They were presented Volunteer Membership Teacher pins during a cake and coffee hour in the offices of Mrs. Marguerite Broen McAllister, chief of the patient services.

Mrs. McAllister, a registered nurse in addition to her status in the department, originated the idea of having RNs as instructors during a month training program, one day a week from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"The training program is planned for members of the

adult volunteer groups, Auxiliary and Volunteers for Children," Mrs. McAllister said. "It will provide instructions and practice in selected nursing procedures. These procedures and function are based on the Harbor Hospital Volunteer definition of duties and responsibilities. Under the direction of a Registered Nurse, the volunteer learns to assist in nursing care to patients. Each day there will be lectures, demonstrations, and practice in the classroom, followed by practical experience under direct supervision on a ward."

"Two objectives will be attained. First, the Volunteer will be better able to provide patient care within the scope of the volunteer capability, and secondly, she will thus be able to act as

consultant to incoming volunteers and assist in teaching," she added.

The instructors will be headed by Minetta Dorrough, R.N., and Betty Wentland, R.N., who also are in charge of the regular nursing training program.
