surveillance about 5:30 Friday evening following a telephone call from an informant.
Officers moved in to make the arrest about 7 p.m., after the informant had placed a telephone call to the suspect and made arrangements to purchase some of the tablets.
Ashman quoted Allen as saying, "I've been kind of expecting you people" when the officers knocked on the door.
Allen told the officers he sold the tablets for \$23 per bag and admitted he had "been dealing for about a year."
The Benzadrine tablets, found in a panel truck at the home, were in two kegs and two paper bags, Ashman said.
Ashman said the arrests marked the end of a "lengthy investigation" conducted by the Torrance officers in cooperation with state narcotics agents.

ARREST of the four steelworkers occurred about 8:30 Friday evening. Officers went to the steel plant, located at 2100 W. 190th St., about 7:30 and waited in the west parking lot to serve a South Bay Municipal Court search warrant signed by Judge Donald Armstrong.

OFFICERS said a partially smoked marijuana cigarette was found on Pearson and a second marijuana cigarette was found on Randle.

Officers quoted one of the suspects as saying, "I'm no big dealer, there's bigger ones working at the plant."
The suspect, officers said, told them he made about \$20 per week from selling marijuana, then added, "I only sell marijuana and not pills. I don't believe in them."
